

AFTER GOOD ROADS

Dorris Representatives to Attend Meeting at Yreka

DORRIS, Calif., Feb. 2.—Together with delegates from Klamath Falls, Madroel, Weed and other towns interested, three men will go to Yreka next Tuesday to represent the Dorris Chamber of Commerce at a hearing of the Weed to Klamath road issue before the Siskiyou county board of supervisors.

For several months citizens of Lattie Valley and Klamath county have been waging an active campaign for the realization of an all-year-round highway from Weed straight through this valley to Klamath Falls, making a shorter and more serviceable route for the heavy automobile travel that seeks the popular scenic wonders of this section. The motive in appearing before the board of supervisors is to secure this route as a county highway, and thereby obtain financial aid in completing construction during the coming summer.

Seventeen miles of excellent highway was constructed last summer by the Weed Lumber company at its own expense. This portion of the road extends northward from the Pacific highway at Weed. Other pieces were worked by the continued efforts of the Dorris and Madroel chambers of commerce last fall.

The coming bond election in Klamath county in which a provision is made for \$40,000 to be used in constructing that portion of the highway extending from Midland across the marsh to the California line is looked upon by citizens of this community with interest. This portion of the proposed new road will eliminate between six and ten miles of travel by the present Keno route. In view of the fact that tourists have been following the Pacific highway to Medford in order to obtain access to Crater Lake National park, thereby necessitating a much longer trip, it is thought extremely urgent that this new highway be completed.
