Dempsey May Meet Brennan on March 17

NEW YORK Feb. 4.—Jack Dempsey will defend his world's heavyweight boxing title against Bill Brennan of Chicago in a 12-round match in Madison Square Garden March 17, it was reported last night.

Managers of the pugilists stated they would sign articles tomorrow. The Chicagoan has twice been knocked out by Dempsey. In 1918 when Jack was on his way to the title, he disposed of Brennan in six rounds; in 1920 in a championship match here Brennan was knocked out in the 12th round.

Plans for a proposed match between Dempsey and Harry Wills, the New Orleans negro heavyweight, have not been abandoned because of the Brennan arrangements, it was said.
