THE FARM BUREAU

If the Herald's good wishes would do the trick, the Klamath County Farm Bureau would have a one hundred per cent membership among the farmers of Klamath County when its campaign closes February 15th, and the Herald is gratified to learn that the local bureau will close the campaign with an augmented membership, even if it does fail to get the signatures of all who are eligible to its benefits.

The relation of agricultural well-being to the prosperity of the nation has always been recognized. When farmers reach a point where the soil yields no profit, the whole financial and economic machine, jars, jolts, and if the impairment long continues, comes to a standstill.

Bankers, doctors, lawyers and merchants are useful citizens but the farmer is an essential unit of society.

Without the farmer to produce the vital things for which we harbor cash, or store up in reserves to keep our currency afloat, we could soon dispense with the banker.

Law and medicine are dignified and honorable callings, and civilization advances because they demand clean ethics and a high moral code from their followers.

In our present complicated society the merchant holds an important place.

But when all is said and done life itself comes from the soil. We would die from starvation and exposure were it not for the country's husbandmen and not all the power of gold, the potency of drugs, nor the gifted pleadings of the barrister would save us.

The machine undoubtedly does its work less efficiently if any of its parts are missing. But without its drive-wheel it does not run at all.

The farmer is the drive wheel.

Farmers have come to realize their importance more of late, and are taking control of their affairs into their own hands. The knowledge that co-operation brings results is sinking in swiftly.

The lessons of the past few years of organization among California's tillers of the soil have been valuable to all agriculturists.

California experienced less distress from last year's depression than any other part of the nation and observers attribute the practically normal prosperity to the co-operative farm organizations' ability to cope with the many serious growing and marketing problems.

In the past three years great strides have been made in the organization of Klamath County farmers.

The Farm Bureau is an association that has justified itself by its accomplishments and it has reached a stage where its effectiveness will grow rapidly from now on.

It is a movement that has proved itself.

THE AMERICAN LEGION AND LABOR

The question is often asked, "What is, and what will be, the attitude of the American Legion toward labor?" and many think the legion in time of crisis will be used as a military organization to subjugate labor.

This is a feeling more among laboring men than elsewhere. It was largely brought about by radical propaganda soon after the armistice, and was easily spread because many legion members were outspoken against the I. W. W. and the slackers who evaded the draft by rushing to various occupations.

Some bitterness was likewise created because some had "copped," and were holding at good pay, some of the very jobs the service men had left to go to war. But that was individual, and has largely passed in the readjustment.

How could the legion be against the laboring man when nine-tenths of the soldiers came from the ranks of labor? If all veterans joined it would have to be over whelmingly pro labor.

The writer has in two state conventions and at the national convention seen any hint that the American Legion might ever be used against labor, quickly and summarily squelched. Radicals in a few local instances have tried to make it appear that the legion had been used against labor. Those cases have been quickly but quietly investigated by state and national headquarters, and to our credit be it said that these charges have been, so far as we know, always found without truth or foundation.

The splendid testimonial given by George L. Berry, president of the International Printing Pressmen's union, after a masterly address on "The Legion and Labor," when 20,000 delegates and their friends at the American Legion convention cheered him to the echo. The fact that the legion convention made him first vice commander, and would possibly have made him commander had he not declined, saying he felt that he could best serve labor in his present position, should speak louder than words.

Almost all the activities of the legion have been carried on mainly to help the laboring men among the ex-soldiers. Men who would not care a rap for a bonus have worked tooth and nail to put it over. Men who wouldn't take a homestead on a bet have toiled unceasingly to get some laboring man a chance to homestead. Anybody that takes a homestead must soon be a laboring man if he is not already one.

The legion is not an "againstster." We are "for," and for the ex-service man, for the community, for the state, for our country and for our flag. If you are against those things the legion may be against you. We know that labor is not now and sincerely hope it never

will be against any of those things. No power within or without the legion could force a member to do military, police, or strike duty. There is nothing to prevent the individual member from doing so if he wishes. In other words, he is a free American citizen. It is the aim of the leaders to make the American Legion an organization that all Americans can be proud of. It is the duty of every ex-service man to help make it so. The best way to do is to become a member. If the legion isn't right, help to make it right.

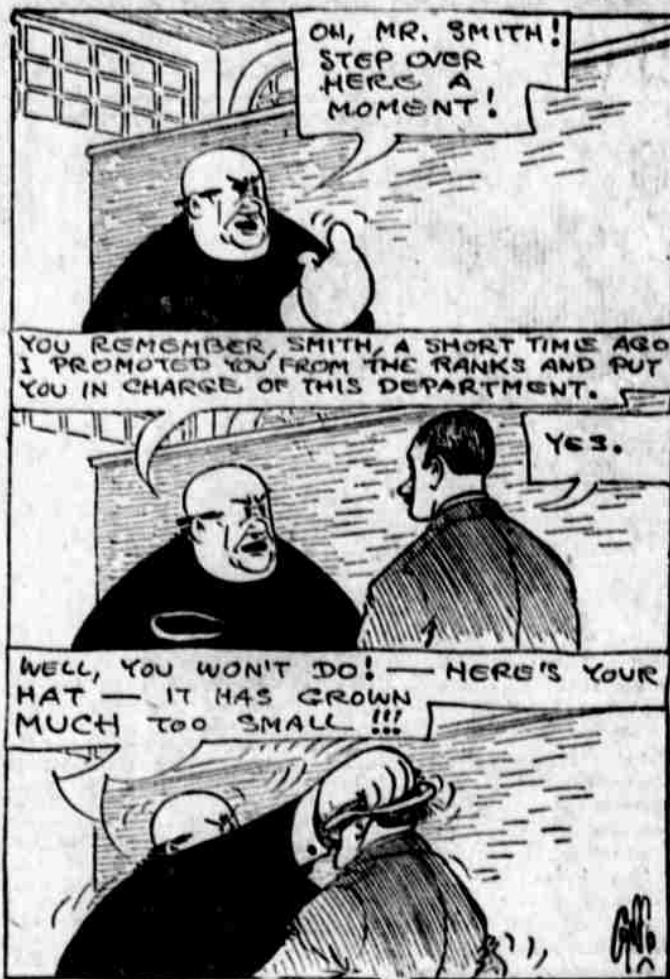
