There are few portrayals on the screen, possessing the historical interest of "Rip Van Winkle," shown at the Strand Theatre today.

Of all his books, this idyll of the Catskills has gained widest recognition, and the famous toast of the inimitable Rip "Here's to your good health and your family's; may they all live long and prosper," has been a household saying for more than a century.

Thomas Jefferson, who appears in the Ward Lascelle picture version of the play, is the fifth generation of his line to follow the stage, and the fourth of his family to play "Rip Van Winkle." His great grandfather, the first Joseph Jefferson, appeared in the premier presentation of the play in Philadelphia in 1829, in a version produced by John Herr, an English author.

The second Joseph Jefferson followed with a different version, and the third of the name, the beloved "Joe" of a generation ago, made his first appearance in the play in a version produced by his half-brother, Charles Burke, at the Arch Street Theatre, Philadelphia, in 1856. He played in "Rip" in London in 1865, and returning to this country the following year, he continued to play the part, with comparatively few other productions intervening, until his death, in 1905, and is now in turn succeeded by his son, who appears in today's version at the Strand.

In addition to this notable attraction, there will be shown a clever comedy and the fifth of the series in the life of Al Jennings, the Reformed Bandit.
