## NEWS OF INTEREST TO KLAMATH LUMBERMEN

### LUMBERMEN INDORSE COMMUNITY SPIRIT

FRESNO, Feb. 7.—Important steps were taken by the California Lumbermen's Association at Fresno to cooperate with the United States government in the building of community spirit, which has lately been so strongly urged.

A meeting of the officers and directors was held in the morning at the Fresno hotel, at which plans were taken up for expansion of their previous plans.

It was proposed by the officers and directors, who are representatives from all parts of the state, to form a committee which would figure out a budget to cover extensive plans in line for this year's objective, which includes not only the building of membership, but important steps toward creating an efficient condition in the lumber industry.

### LOGGING OPERATIONS HALTED BY WEATHER

PORTLAND, Feb. 7.—Logging operations in a majority of the camps of Western Oregon and Western Washington will be held up for several weeks, according to announcement last week by J. T. Dougall, manager of the Columbia River Loggers' Information Bureau. Alternate freezing and thawing weather has

weakened logging roads and trestles so that extensive repairs are necessary before the camps can be operated, he stated.

Out of 42 logging camps in the Columbia river association, he reports only 14 operating. Others are engaged in repair work. Heavy snowfall has seriously interfered with the industry in many of the higher camps. Mills in the river district are supplied with present needs and no serious log shortage is anticipated.

The tone of the lumber market continues strong with a steady increase in purchasing, according to officials of the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

### S. F. CHAMBER MAY DEAL IN FUTURES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Secretary Wallace announced today the designation of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce as a contract market for barley, and the designation of the Los Angeles Grain Exchange as a contract market for barley, sorghums and corn, within the meaning of the future trading act. Members of the two exchanges therefore will be permitted to deal in contracts for future delivery of these commodities without being subject to the tax of 20 cents a bushel on each contract for future.

### Auto Speedway to Be Built Near Spokane

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 6.—Tentative plans for the construction of a mile and an eighth wooden automobile speedway at Alan racetrack have been announced by J. H. Sessmith, owner and manager. The track is just across the Idaho state line, about 20 miles east of Spokane.

Mr. Sessmith said that he was going to California this month to negotiate with racing authorities for a position and dates in the western automobile racing circuit. If he can

make suitable arrangements, he said, construction will start at once at the track.

An attempt will be made to have the Spokane racing dates between June 30 and July 3, just previous to the Tacoma Speedway events.

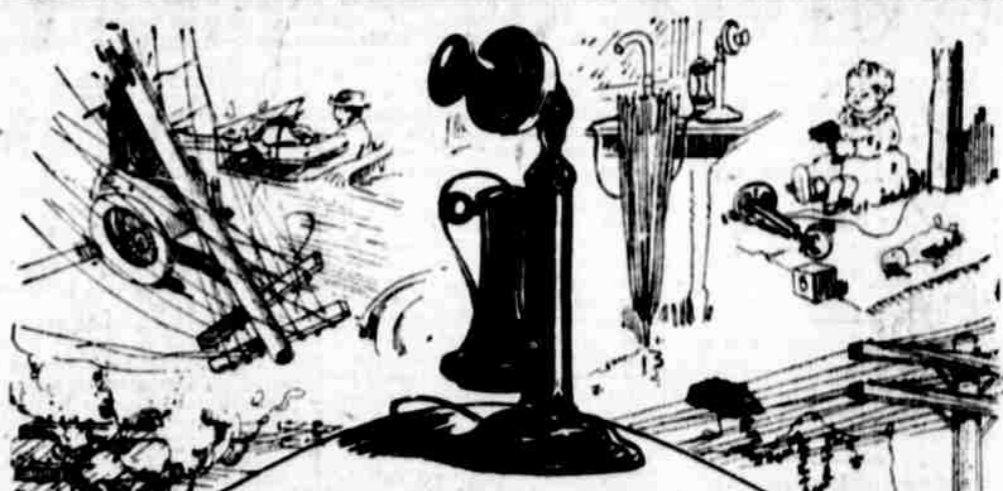

It then is put into cans that have been sterilized with live steam, and is taken to the Klamath Falls plant, where the same careful, sanitary methods are used in pasteurizing and bottling.

For those who do not desire the pasteurized product, we furnish raw milk. This is put up under the same sanitary methods.
