ASSOCIATED RAISIN GROWERS ARE HELD TO BE SUCCESSFUL

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 8.—The California Associated Raisin company, a co-operative marketing organization composed of more than 10,000 individual grape growers, is stronger today than ever before as a result of a decree filed by the department of justice January 18, Wylie M. Giffen, president of the association, declared in a statement issued here to clear up erroneous reports that the department's action would cripple the organization and the co-operative marketing movement.

The action, which was ended by the filing of the decree, was brought by the government three years ago, and was intended to dissolve the raisin company on charges that it was a trust operating in restraint of trade.

"The Associated company is stronger than ever before," President Giffen's statement said. "It knows finally what it can do and what it cannot do. While it has always tried to observe both the letter and the spirit of the law, there has existed a feeling of uncertainty as to what the law was in the final construction. That uncertainty is over. Our legal status is at last established, and we can go ahead now, with our heads erect and our hearts full of pride at what we have accomplished so far, to the achievement of greater things for the farmer in the name of co-operation."

Under the decree, the raisin company is prohibited from carrying out the contract under which it operated at the time the suit was brought. This contract, President Giffen says in his statement, expired last spring, and the company since that time has been operating under a new form of contract, which conforms in every particular with the stipulations of the decree.

The decree prohibits the company from obtaining contracts by coercion. President Giffen denies the practice of selling "firm at opening" is prohibited. The statement says that the company abandoned this form of selling more than a year ago.

The decree prevents the raisin company making contracts by which competitors become exclusive agents, but it does not compel the company to sell to all because sales are made to one. The company, in the terms of the decree, is barred from curtailing or decreasing the supply of raisins, or destroying them to restrict competition. This has never been done, the raisin company head claims, nor has the company ever stipulated the selling price, or that the purchaser should not do business with the company's competitors.

The action against the raisin company first took the form of hearings before the federal trade commission at Washington, and later the department of justice, through the attorney general, filed suit against the company in the United States courts for the Southern District of California, before Judge Benjamin F. Bledsoe.

HARDING COMES FIRST RIVERSIDE, Cal., Feb. 8.—President Harding is soon to have a box of Washington navel oranges picked from the first tree of that variety ever planted in California. On instructions from Mayor S. C. Evans, the fruit was picked recently from the tree, which stands in a city park here, and is to be sent to Washington as a gift from the city.

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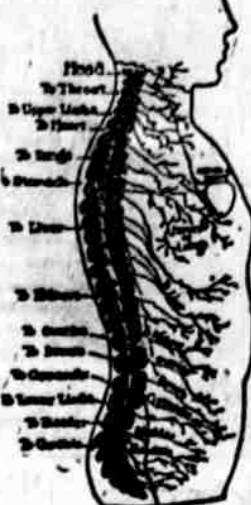
