NEWS OF INTEREST TO KLAMATH LUMBERMEN

Production 13 Per Cent Below Normal

One hundred and twenty-nine mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending February 4, manufactured 75,959,140 feet of lumber; sold 66,361,854 feet, and shipped 62,268,328 feet.

Production was 13 per cent below normal; new business was 13 per cent below production and shipments 17 per cent below production.

Forty-three per cent of all new business taken during the week was accepted for future water delivery. This amounted to 28,831,854 feet, of which 19,737,154 feet will move coastwise and intercoastal and 9,094,700 feet will move over-seas.

Thirty-nine per cent of the week's shipments moved by water, totaling 24,578,328 feet, of which 11,165,385 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal, and 13,412,943 feet export. The rail movement for the

week was 1,293 cars. The unshipped balance in the domestic cargo trade totaled 102,651,864 feet, and in the export trade 92,792,172 feet. In the rail trade the unshipped balance amounted to 4,121 cars.

The feature of the second half was the individual work of Baker, the fast little forward from the Agency, who did not seem to be "on" the first period, but who in the second came back and shot five field goals. The Klamath Falls-Merrill game, altho a walk-away for the former team, proved an interesting contest, and was bitterly fought from start to finish. The Merrill guards were unable to check the shooting of Shriver, who made eight field goals, and of Koetz who made 10. The feature of this game was the floor work of Grove, the fast little Klamath forward.

Immediately after the final game, A. F. Glover, speaking for Bert McDonald and himself, presented the large silver loving cup to the victorious Bonanza team. At the same time he explained the conditions under which the cup was to be given. Before any school can retain permanent possession of the trophy, he said, its basketball team must win the county championship three consecutive seasons.
