Canada Ranks Second
in Number of Phones

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 17.—Can-
ada ranks second among the na-
tions of the world to the United
States in the number of telephones
per hundred of population, according
to the statistical bureau of the
Canadian government.

The United States has 13.6 tele-
phones per hundred of population,
and Canada has 9.8, according to
these records.

"In 1921 there were 856,266 tele-
phones in use in Canada, an in-
crease of 10 per cent over 1920.
The wire mileage used was 2,105,
101, and the average persons per
mile were 4.2," says the bureau re-
port.

"Naturally the most tele-
phones in the dominion are in the
large cities. Such cities as Mont-
real, Quebec, Toronto, Ottawa, Win-
nipeg, Calgary, Edmonton, Vancou-
ver, and Victoria have as good tele-
phone service as any cities in the
United States. But in the last two
or three years there has been a very
large increase in the number of
telephones in the rural districts of
the prairie provinces."

Progress is Made
in Construction of
Lewis and Clark Road

MISSOULA, Mont., Feb. 17.—
Further progress is being made in
construction of the Lewis and Clark
highway from Missoula to Lewiston,
Idaho, according to Bert F. Savage,
secretary of the Lewis and Clark
highway association.

Five miles of the highway at the
Lewiston end is to be constructed
this year, at a cost of approxi-
mately \$70,000, he says. This will
carry the project to a point ten miles
above Lewiston. The construction
work will meet both federal and
state specifications.

At Kouskia, three highway dis-
tricts are joining to finance con-
struction of an eight mile stretch
between Kouskia and Kamiah. For-
est reserve aid will be asked on this
road, the plans providing for about
\$40,000 worth of work this season,
Mr. Savage says.

With the bridge construction
above Spaulding progressing, and
the project between Orofino and
Greer financed, it appears that the
road will be suitable for travel
from Lewiston to Greer, by early
fall, leaving outside of the Selway
forest, only the stretch between
Kamiah and Greer to be completed.
