IT'S SATISFACTORY

JUDGE KENESAW MOUNTAIN LANDIS has resigned from the federal bench to assume the dictatorship of American baseball. It is a satisfactory arrangement for all concerned. For Landis it means a more congenial occupation; for baseball it means the lifting of the shadow of suspicion that has lain upon the professional side of the sport since the world series scandals and for the public who contribute the gate receipts it means a "run for their money."

Landis was a spectacular figure on the bench. Doubtless he expressed the innate American spirit of fair play and dealt in a clean brand of justice, but he is not of the judicial temperament. His blood runs too warm. The perfect judicial mind leaves the human equation out of the analysis of legal problems. It is swayed by neither the judge's own personal feelings and attributes, nor personalities that crop up in the progress of the case of issue.

Landis was never of this type. From the \$29,000,000 fine assessed upon the Standard Oil company, which brought him into general prominence as a judicial figure, to the last spectacular case, in which he held that bankers, through payment of low salaries to bank employees, shared a certain amount of responsibility when the employee went wrong, his decisions have been untrammelled by any regard of the frank expression of his opinions would have.

Such freedom of spirit is praiseworthy. It is as necessary to the development of a free country as is breath to the body. But it is not a characteristic that is associated with the law's administration, as the bench is concerned with it.

As long as his last spectacular opinion was a matter for congressional criticism and general controversy, Landis would not resign. It is not his nature to quit under fire. But now he is in training with the rest of the baseball crew for the opening of the season. Regardless of whether or not his retirement from the bench will be a loss to the law, the public will universally acclaim it as a distinct gain to organized baseball.

VERY BAD MAN IS "BILL" HART IN NEW PLAY

William S. Hart has been seen in many character portrayals of Western bad men—gamblers, bandits and two-gun men turned parsons and sheriffs. But if he took all of those characters, it is said, and placed them in the melting pot the result would be of angelic design in comparison to the part played by this popular star in the drama, "The Gun Fighter," by Monte M. Katterjohn, in which he is presented by Thomas H. Ince as star.

The locale of this story is an Arizona desert town, and Hart portrays a bandit of the worst kind—a "killer," which title he has justly earned. He is finally persuaded by those in authority to become a sheriff in order that he may kill a half-breed raider, though it is the hope of the authorities that both will be killed and thus render the state two services in one. One can easily appreciate, it is said, the many exciting situations that result and the opportunity it affords this popular star to portray the character in a manner for which he is famed.

"The Gun Fighter" will live and breathe, it is stated, for many moons to come as one of Bill Hart's masterpieces. Also two good comedies.

representatives of wine-growers and sales-agents that will sit in Paris under the presidency of Former Minister of Agriculture, J. H. Ricard, from March 12 to 19.

The closing of the United States markets has caused a tremendous injury to the wine trade in France. The fact that the Scandinavian states have also gone dry or on rations of intoxicants and South American vineyards are daily becoming larger and more productive thus restricting imports to the lowest ebb in years, has awakened the French wine-growers to their danger.

Wine stocks have accumulated although there has been no decrease in the price of wine to the trade of consumer.

One of the most important articles on the agenda of the convention is the following: "Investigate and report on the sale of wine in the United States; how public opinion in the United States is disposed toward the present dry regime; is there any reason to suppose that some modification will be adopted allowing wines to enter. What are the frauds in existence by which the present law is being evaded."

Another article reads: "Establishing closer relations between American wine buyers and French wine selling agents in order to ensure the authenticity of French wine and avoid falsification. Collaborate in attempt revert to former international agreements and internal legislation in the United States."

CHINESE OFFICERS PROPOSE TO SCRAP NAVY TO MEET PAY

Would Go Arms Conference. One Better; Salaries Unpaid for Many Long Months

PEKING, Feb. 20.—Officers of the Chinese navy have proposed to go to the Washington Arms Conference. They are one better by scrapping the entire Chinese navy and selling it to pay their salaries which are in arrears.

(The Chinese navy consisted in 1920 of six protected cruisers, three destroyers, eight torpedo boats, three gunboats, four gunboats and in a considerable number of river gunboats. Nine of these, however, were under control of the Southern government located at Canton.)

The Chinese officers proposed also that all battleships and cruisers should be scrapped.

The Chinese press asserts that it is in the interest of their salaries, rather than of the peace of the world that the Chinese naval officers proposed this drastic step.

As in the case of many government departments of China at the present time, salaries for many back months are due the officials and personnel of the navy and the conference of officers was called to consider ways and means of forcing the Ministry of Finance to allocate to the Ministry of Marine sufficient money to make up these deficits.

Feeling that sale of all naval property and abolition of the navy was the surest way of obtaining the necessary funds, the officers decided to put this proposition before the people.

Their alternative in case this scheme failed to meet with approval, was that officials who had illegally withheld their pay from them be made personally responsible.

FARM POINTERS

Clean-Up Spray Due

The clean-up spray of lime-sulphur should be applied this month or early in March, choosing days when the weather is good. This spray will rid the trees of scale, spider mites, and aphids, and is especially necessary for blight mites. On prune, peach, and apricot trees it is also needed.

Seed Potatoes Inspected

Since there is so little certified seed potatoes this year the experiment station is receiving samples of potatoes which are being inspected for seed purposes. Farmers who want to know how good their stock is may find out roughly by sending in 35 to 50 typical potatoes for examination. There are indications of a strong demand for certified fields this year—O. A. C. Experiment station.

Dwarf Essex rape seeded in late April, May or June on rich land makes excellent sheep or hog pasture for late spring and summer. One acre usually carries 10 to 15 animals. Plan now for a place for this crop.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

D. 1922 within the Lange Valley Irrigation District of Klamath County, Oregon for the purpose of determining whether a certain contract shall be entered into between the said Lange Valley Irrigation District and the United States of America for the construction of an irrigation system, including diversion dam, canals and laterals, pumping plants, etc., and for a water right for 6,250 acres of land within the Clear Lake Division of the said Lange Valley Irrigation District, whereof and whereby the maximum amount to be assumed by said Lange Valley Irrigation District is three hundred and eighty seven thousand dollars and the proportionate part of the operation and maintenance cost of the Clear Lake reservoir and storage works.
