BE CHARITABLE

"FOR the good that I would, I do not," complains Paul in the seventh chapter of his letter to the Romans, "but the evil which I would not, that I do."

After two thousand years the words stand as an expression of the mixed results of mankind's best motives applicable every day.

Forces from within and without, but primarily from without, are constantly exerting pressure upon us. Starting with the best motive on a given line of conduct, we steer a steady course until lack of understanding among those around us arises. A breath of suspicion grows to a gale. It is a strong mind that can then avoid some deviation.

But the only safe way is straight ahead. To veer in one direction means an over-stepping of bounds in the other when we endeavor to regain the original track. There follows aimless zig-zagging that can end only in two ways—lost headway toward the original goal, or shipwreck.

We all have our own graveyards of thwarted ideals and ruined hopes. We know within ourselves that we started with the highest motives, but ignorance, jealousy and distrust did their deadly work and aim that might have fruited in great advancement of the common good, perished in the blossom.

This experience should make us more charitable in our judgment of the motives of others, less sure in our censure. Even if we are certain our opponent is mistaken, we should exercise great caution before we denounce his sincerity.

The ability to judge clearly of his own motives, and to make allowances for others' misjudgment, is the true measure of the individual mind, and that is the highest attribute of creation.

It is well expressed in Kipling's formula:

"If you can trust yourself
when all men doubt you;
But make allowance
for their doubting, too."

But in self confidence it is not necessary that the opinions of others should be slighted; that motives of others should be impugned without evidence. The other fellow is likely to be right as often as you are, and if you are both equally wrong on fifty per cent of the matters on which you disagree, then by combination, consultation and compromise you will both get new viewpoints that will reduce the factor of human fallibility, and you will both gain.

Co-operation is the hope of democracy. Where the majority rules it is essential that the majority should be right. Before the majority is right it is necessary that the individuals who make up the majority must be right. This end can be attained only by wider knowledge of your neighbor's ideas, motives and ideals. Talk to him, argue with him, and endeavor to persuade him, but give him credit for the same honesty of conviction and purpose in sustaining his side of the question that you know animates you in upholding yours.

Citizens military training camps, similar to those held last summer, are planned at the Presidio of San Francisco, Camp Lewis, Washington, and Fort Douglas, Utah. The San Francisco camp will be for men of the 91st Division, which comprises California, and will open July 6 and close August 4. The Camp Lewis and Fort Douglas camps will handle men from the 96th and 104th Division areas, respectively, and will be held from July 27 to August 25.

Camps for members of the Organized Reserves of the United States Army will be held in the 96th and 104th Divisions at Camp Lewis and Fort Douglas from July 10 to 22, preceding the C. M. T. camps. The California Organized Reserves will go into camp at Monterey August 14 and remain until August 26.

Western senior college men who are members of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps, will have an opportunity to attend the following camps:

Infantry camps at the Presidio of San Francisco and Camp Lewis; cavalry camp at Monterey, California; field artillery camp at Camp Lewis; coast artillery camp at Fort Scott, California, or Fort Worden, Washington; air service at Mather Field, California; engineer camp at Camp Lewis; quartermaster corps camp at San Francisco and a medical, dental and veterinary camp at Camp Lewis.

In addition to the C. M. T. and the R. O. T. C., and the Organized Reserves Camps, there will be National Guard Encampments, the details of which will be announced later.

"In the absence of any appropriation for the Organized Reserves," he said, "the best we can do will be to hold camps at Camp Lewis, Fort Douglas, Monterey and possibly one or two air service camps for such reserve officers as can afford the time and money to attend a 15 days' camp at their own expense and without pay from the government."

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
