## SPORTS

WLADSK ZBYNSKO WINS  
FROM JOE STECHER

NEW YORK, Feb. 24.—Wladsk Zbynsko won the heavyweight wrestling championship of America at Madison Square Garden Tuesday night, throwing Joe Stecher for two of the three scheduled falls. Zbynsko gave Stecher the first and third tumbles, while he himself suffered the second. Zbynsko won the first fall in 29 minutes with a head and crotch hold. Stecher took the second with a head and body in 14 minutes, while Wladsk easily won the third in six minutes and 45 seconds. Zbynsko weighed 209 pounds, while Stecher tipped the scales at 217. The bout was fast as long as it lasted, but as usual under the rules of rolling and flying falls, neither man was aware that he had won or lost a fall until convinced by the referee. The crowd was small and lacked the usual enthusiasm.

Cliff Buckley, a giant of a lad from Columbia, Ohio, bumped his shoulders on the floor in two rolling falls, losing a match to Ed Strangler Lewis, first fall in 9 minutes 30 seconds, and second in 28 minutes 30 seconds. This match, limited to one hour, was the semi-final.

Dick Davis of Texas, and John Olin of Nebraska, wrestled a draw, gaining one fall each under the time limit of 45 minutes.

### U. OF O. HAS NOT YET NAMED FOOTBALL CAPTAIN

EUGENE, Feb. 24.—University of Oregon is the only member of the Pacific Coast conference which has not yet elected a football captain for 1922, and Coach "Shy" Huntington makes no mention of calling the squad together for an election.

Campus discussion of the situation recalls the football days of 1916, when Huntington, then a player on the team, was competing with another member of the squad for the position of captain. Rivalry was so keen that Hugo Bezdek, Oregon's famous coach of the early days, was afraid an election might split the team, so he refused to permit any choice, saying that he thought football captains were superfluous and generally useless.

Perhaps Huntington remembers those days now, for there is close rivalry between two players, "Tiny" Shields and George King, for the post of 1922 leader.

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 24.—Joe Simonich of Butte, Montana, former welterweight champion of the Ninety-First (Wild West) division, has been meeting with success on his boxing tour of the Philippine islands, according to word received here from his manager, Eddie Tait. He has been defeating or drawing with the best welters in the island, Tait writes.

### PORTLAND CARRIES LIMIT

PORTLAND, Feb. 24.—Twenty men, the league limit, will be on the Portland club of the Pacific Coast league between May 1 and September 1. President William Klepper has announced. There will be five outfielders, five infielders, seven pitchers and three catchers.

EUGENE, Feb. 24.—Belief that colleges should have no place for
