25 Boys Turn Out for K. C. H. S. Baseball Team

A call for baseball men yesterday at the high school received response from 25 boys, who expressed a desire to make the team. Several others who could not attend the meeting sent word that they did not wish to be overlooked.

Leslie Peyton was elected manager. Possibility of games with Medford, Grants Pass and Ashland were discussed. It was decided if possible to have Earl Hilton talk to the boys on early training and to give the aspirants to the pitcher's box some inside tips on the game.

Few Changes Made in County Field Meet Rules

The rules governing the county school field meet, scheduled for May 13, which were adopted by the county athletic committee Saturday, were the same as last year with a few minor changes. The grade school boys and girls are to be classified according to weight

and age, and entered in events arranged for their particular class.

Those governing the high school events will be the A. A. U. interscholastic rules.

The boys of the elementary schools will be divided into three classes. Boys under 75 pounds weight. Class 1; from 75 to 89 pounds. Class 2; 100 pounds or over. Class 3. There will be two classes of girls, those under 12 years of age. Class 1; over 12 years. Class 2. High school pupils will all come under one class.

Elementary school pupils belonging in school at the time of the meet who were in attendance May 1, 1922, provided such pupils have attended school at least thirty days during the current school year, are eligible to enter the meet. High school pupils must be eligible under the rules of the Oregon High School Athletic association.

The events for the boys of Class 1 will be: the pull up, the standing broad jump, the 60 and 100 yard dashes; for Class 2: the pull up, the running broad jump, the running high jump, the 60 and 100 yard dashes; and for Class 3: the running high jump, the running broad jump, and the 60, 100 and 220 yard dashes. Besides these events for boys there has been arranged a one mile relay for an unlimited class.

The events for girls of class 1 will be the pull up, the Indian club or potato race, and the 50 and 100 yard dashes; and for Class 2: the Indian club or potato race, throwing for distance and the 50 and 100 yard dashes. There was also arranged a 220 yard relay race for an unlimited class of girls.

Each school is allowed to enter five in each event, aside from relays. A contestant is allowed to enter any number of events. In each relay, each school enters one team regardless of other entries.

In scoring, first place will count five points, second place four, third place three, fourth place two and fifth place one. Ribbons will be presented to the winners of places in the events. The winning school will be presented with a silver loving cup.

The high schools will compete in the usual 15 interscholastic events, with four special events for girls, and will be governed by the A. A. U. rules usually ruling in such meets. Three entries will be allowed in each event, three places will be awarded. Each participant placing in an event will be awarded with a ribbon, and the winning school will also be given a silver cup.

All the county schools, Sacred Heart Academy of Klamath Falls and the Klamath Agency boarding school are being invited to enter teams.

A county athletic committee decided to hold a county track and field meet for both elementary and high schools, to present cups to the winning schools, and to award individual place winners with appropriate prizes. It was planned to have both meets on the same day by running the grade school events in the forenoon and the high school events in the afternoon.

The athletic committee consisted of County School Superintendent, Mrs. Ferguson, Principal Goetz, J. P. Wells and Robert Clay of Klamath Falls, Fred Peterson of Merrill, James Luebke of Bonanza, and R. K. Hannon of Malin. They were appointed during institute last October.
