

Production 12 Per Cent Below Normal

One hundred and thirty mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending February 25th manufactured 77,837,718 feet of lumber; sold 65,664,842 feet, and shipped 70,201,953 feet.

Production was only 12 per cent below normal. New business was 15 per cent below normal. Shipments were 10 per cent below production.

Forty-two per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future delivery by water. This amounted to 27,444,842 feet, of which 11,931,606 feet will move coastwise and intercoastal, and 15,513,236 feet will move export. New business for delivery by rail amounted to 1,274 carloads.

Forty per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 28,171,953 feet, of which the domestic clearances accounted for 19,259,918 feet and overseas clearances 8,926,065 feet. Rail shipments amounted to 1,461 cars.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders total 89,559,218, and unfilled export orders 95,496,602. Unfilled rail orders total 4,341 carloads.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 4.—Simon O'Donnell, formerly president of the Chicago Building Trades council, and three other labor leaders charged with graft, extortion and conspiracy in connection with an alleged building trust here, today were acquitted by the jury.

14 KILLED IN TRAIN AND BUS COLLISION

CLEVELAND, March 4.—The collision of a New York central passenger train and bus at Plainville last night resulted in 14 deaths. Five were seriously injured and three are expected to die.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 4.—Funds to continue transcontinental air mail service has been provided under an agreement by the senate committee. The house had refused to provide funds.

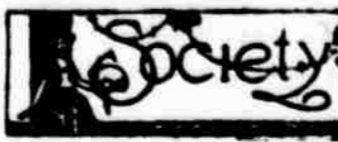
F. W. Sexton has moved his place
