Credits Next in Importance

"Next to the matter of transportural credits. We are just now getting shaped up a new credit bill. based on the findings of the joint agricultural commission, which would set up new machinery for more adequate credit through the federal farm loan board.

"There is now a gap between the short-term 60-day and 90-day paper and the long-term mortgage loan on land which must be filled.

"There is a need for credits running from six months to three years to farmers and stock raisers to enable them to make the necessary thrnover in their products.

"The result of the present financial system, devised to fit business, not agriculture, is that the farmer must often market under the most unfavorable conditions.

"Next come the problems of marketing. One of the biggest things this government can do, I believe. is to ghape up a new and efficient code or system of marketing its agricultural products. This is in the interest of the consumer as much as of the producer.

"Today the United States has the costliest and most inefficient system of marketing of any country in the

Bloc Proud of Record

"That the farm bloc has been able to get things done is due to the fact that the things for which it has fought have been fundamentally correct. Among the more notable of these measures have been:

"1st. The Capper-Volstead cooperative marketing bill.

2nd. The future trading bill, regulating grain exchanges. "3rd. The revival of the war finance corporation as an aid to help-

ing move farm products. "4th. Increasing funds available for loans by the farm loan board by \$50,000,000.

"5th. Passage by the senate of the bill giving agriculture a representative on the federal reserve
