OPINION OF ROAD NEEDS IS EXPRESSED

To the Editor:—The county voters having spoken so generously and positively for good roads by the recent bond issue, the next problem for consideration is where to locate roads and how to build them.

The road to Ashland will never, in my judgment, do the logical and material interests of Klamath county sufficiently to justify the price now being expended. There is now about 23 miles of this road graded and partly graveled—fourteen miles under contract and the rest under contemplation, which will, when finished, cost more than one million dollars.

This road has now been closed to travel for two months and probably will be for two more on account of deep snow, and it is not unreasonable and perfectly safe to presume that it will be impassable for the same reason four months of each season. We of Klamath are justly entitled to a more feasible route to reach the Pacific Highway at any season of the year.

The most logical, reasonable, practical, efficient and economical route for each and every requirement for Klamath, either ingress or egress at all times of the season, would be to enter the Klamath river canyon at Keno and follow a water grade to the state line near Shovel creek where we might feel perfectly justified in expecting California to cheerfully and liberally respond to such an enterprise by completing the road to the state highway. This would have been an all year round road and at any time traffic could be operated at home it could have reached the Pacific Highway, for every mile would bring the traveler to a lower and milder climate with less resistance of deep snows. As a scenic road it would be unsurpassed on the Pacific coast besides a direct route through Klamath Falls to Crater Lake and back to the Pacific highway at Medford, a feature most gratifying to the tourists, who are a prominent asset to any community as money spenders.

All objective points outside of Klamath county are at a lower altitude and this is the only route by which the traveler starts down hill. Crater lake is our natural wonder and drawing card and every tourist is possessed of a natural desire to view its beauties—it is also quite distasteful for any traveling pleasure seeker to travel the same road twice. Therefore to invite and solicit the

traveler it is necessary to provide ways and means for him to go one way and come the other. A traveler on the Pacific Highway from the south to Ashland would scarcely be expected to turn back over a high mountain with no unusual scenery to Crater lake when it is possible to pass over a nice paved road twelve miles to Medford and there leave the Pacific Highway for the objective point over a better road and back to the same place or pursue his journey on north and deprive himself of the trip to the lake entirely.

It is a conservative estimate under present conditions that Klamath loses three-fourths of the travel from the south and one-half from the north. There is no one in our midst subject to be called on the carpet for this situation, for reliable information discloses the fact that the state highway commission adopted the Ashland route upon their own motion and refused to be persuaded from it.

The Klamath river route will eventually be adopted but perhaps not in the near future and as it is so nearly parallel and near the Ashland road it is unreasonable to expect any aid either from the state or United States at the present and the county cannot assume the whole burden of from one-half to three-fourths of a million dollars; therefore is compelled to adopt the most feasible solution for the present which is a road to the state line near Derris, with an outlet at Weed, with the assurance that California will construct her portion without delay.

We need exercise no surprise however should the constituted authorities of our neighbor county fail to respond with the same zealous pride they would in constructing and maintaining this road were it not for the express purpose of drawing traffic from the towns and cities of Shasta valley, the most densely populated portion of Siskiyou county, and diverting it toward Klamath Falls for Crater lake. All other plans routed by the county court are as full and complete as could be expected of good judgment and foresight; considering

the acute circumstances and funds available. There is no inhabitant of the county, no odds how remote his residence, but who will receive some benefit from these trunk lines, which later on can and will be connected by short roads to small neighborhoods. R. A. EMMETT.
