FEWER EARTHQUAKES, LESS LOSS OF LIFE, DURING YEAR 1921

(By the Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 20.—Fewer earthquakes, with no loss of life and very little damage to property, marked 1921 as compared with 1920, Prof. Francis A. Tondorf, director of the Georgetown University Seismological observatory here, announced today in his yearly official bulletin.

"The year stands out as one of low seismicity," said Professor Tondorf. "Our observatory seismographs records 61 earthquake disturbances during 1921, as against 68 in 1920. We have received dispatches placing the number of earthquakes the world over at 107 for the year. Of these, 77 were disturbances within the United States, while in 1920 there were 93 earthquakes reported in this country."

Alaska had one quake last year compared with one in 1920, while Hawaii had one in 1921 and none in 1920. Those in Alaska and Hawaii last year, the first on March 11 and the latter on March 24, were severe and were of volcanic origin, Prof. Tondorf reports. Two of those in Utah were very strong disturbances while the others reported in the United States were of little significance.

There were no pronounced tidal waves reported from vessels plying the oceans and other waters. Prof. Tondorf says, and it therefore is considered unlikely there were any extensive submarine earthquakes during the year.
