

MRS. W. R. JONES DEAD

Pneumonia Claims Aged Resident of City After Long Illness

Mrs. William R. Jones, for the past seven years a resident of this city, died here this morning. She was aged 79 years and six months. The immediate cause of her death was pneumonia, although she had been in failing health for the past several years and for the past five years had been in charge of a nurse.

Mrs. Jones was born in Loudoun county, Virginia, September 16, 1842. Her maiden name was Elizabeth A. Gregg. In 1865, she was married to William R. Jones, in Virginia. A year later a son Wilbur A. Jones was born to the union. In 1872 Mr. and Mrs. Jones and son came from Virginia to Oregon, settling on a farm near Medford, where they lived for about thirty years, and where William R. Jones died in 1911.

In 1915 Mrs. Jones came with her son to Klamath Falls, where she has since made her home, her son providing generously for her care during her years of invalidism.

The family is well known here. Wilbur A. Jones, having until a year ago been superintendent of the Ankeny ranch on the Merrill road for seven years.

Besides her son Mrs. Jones is survived by a grandson, William A. Jones, Jr., of Klamath Falls and several brothers and sisters, residing in Virginia.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Whitlock chapel. The Rev. A. L. Rice will make a brief address. The burial will take place in the local cemetery.

SMITH FORUM LEADER

Will Answer Dunbar's Arguments on Commission Government

W. O. Smith, city councilman, will answer R. H. Dunbar's arguments given out at the Forum last Wednesday and advocate the councilman form of government tomorrow at the regular Wednesday chamber of commerce forum.

Smith is as much enthused over the councilman form of government as Dunbar is over the city manager plan, and as he is no less capable in getting before the public his ideas, the meeting promises to be an interesting one to those who are interested in municipal finance and city government.

Smith was on the losing side of the debate held recently before the study club, but the decision did not discourage him in his contention that the only trouble with any form of government is the people who consent to be governed; that if there is any complaint to be made, it should be in the form of a recognition that people only get what they deserve; and that if they are interested in good government, they should stand back of the people they elect to enforce the law. Smith will represent the entire council tomorrow and will be the principal speaker.

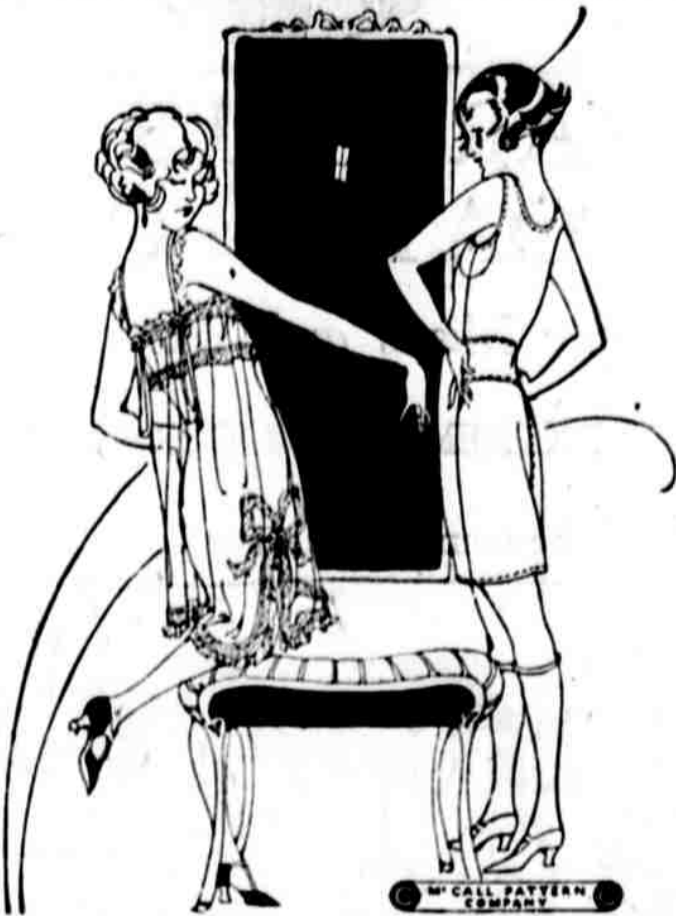

Milady's Undergarments Are of Simple Tailoring in Cloths of Bizarre Patterns



There are two strong tendencies, seemingly opposed to each other, which have manifested themselves this spring in underwear fashions, which the discriminating woman now studies with the same care which she devotes to her outer garments.

The first is towards more tailored undergarments, and the other is towards bizarre effects.

Satin striped radium silks are in the lead as the popular fabric for strictly tailored undies. Corduroy crepe is also extensively used.

Many gorgeous and barbaric effects are gained by the use of colors that once would have seemed out of the question for underwear. Black radium with little panels of flame-colored silk inset, for instance, makes one

lovely set. Vivid yellow, in the new shade, "dent de lion," is also being extensively used, with trimmings of self color, black, or a bright blue.

While all the colors of the rainbow are seen in the latest underthings, the dainty and very feminine ones still hold first place in popularity. Orchid is the closest rival to flesh pink though Princess Mary's fondness for blue is likely to boom that color, in all shades, this spring.

One-tone satin brocaded crepes are also popular, those in white being especially liked for trousseau sets.

Delicate cottons are by no means out of the running, particularly for the athletic type of garment. Dimities in a variety of striped and checked effects, volles and printed muslins and cotton crepes are to be had.
