DR. LORENZ APPEARS AS CORSET ADVOCATE

NEW YORK, March 28.—Dr. Adolph Lorenz appeared as an earnest advocate of corsets for women during his health department clinic recently.

SUBSTITUTE FOR PLATINUM IS FOUND BY U. S. SCIENTISTS

WASHINGTON, March 29.—Government scientists after extensive investigations have found what they declare to be satisfactory substitutes for platinum for various purposes, according to an announcement by the United States bureau of mines. In chemical requirements and for use in high-duty electrical contracts, however, the announcement said, no substitute for platinum has ever been discovered. One of the most promising substitutes was said by the experts to be what has come to be known as "white gold," which is an alloy of gold and one of the platinum metals. This closely resembles platinum. It was said, and is not attacked by nitric acid. "White gold" is used extensively in certain classes of jewelry but does not replace platinum in the manufacture of high class jewelry. It was pointed out.

Experts in the bureau of mines said that owing to its resistance to the action of acids and most chemical agents, even at high temperature, and to its high melting point, platinum has been used extensively for the manufacture of crucibles, basins, foils and wire, and for chemical laboratory work. Most of the metal produced in the United States is said to be recovered as a secondary mineral from placer operations and from the electrolytic refining of gold bullion and blister content. From time to time, the bureau said, the beach sands of Oregon and Northern California had been exploited by promoters on the basis of the gold and platinum content.
