

MAN WANTED HERE ON SPURIOUS CHECK CHARGE IS CAUGHT

Bryan Hawkins Arrested in Clarks-ville, Arkansas; Said to Have Sold Out Father's Business

Bryan Hawkins of this city, wanted here for passing a bad check on the K. K. K. store, has been apprehended in Clarksville, Arkansas, where he is held for extradition, according to a telegram received yesterday by J. F. Morley, county detective, from Sheriff D. V. Bartlett at Clarksville.

According to Morley, Hawkins sold the dairy business of his father, W. H. Hawkins, during the latter's absence with Mrs. Hawkins in California where they were visiting friends, and pocketing the \$4,000 derived from the sale, together with the proceeds of the bad check, departed from this city on March 2. A warrant was issued for his arrest and information was sent to police officials throughout the west.

When arrested, the telegram stated, Hawkins was driving a new Dodge car, possessed \$50 in cash and a bank book showing \$2000 on deposit in Houston, Texas. He had offered to put up \$1,000 cash bail for his appearance here.

The money obtained by sale of the dairy was said to have represented

the entire capital of the boy's father, who was said to have been left without funds.
