HIGH SCHOOL HAS GOOD MATERIAL FOR A BASEBALL TEAM

The high school has plenty of material for a good baseball team this spring and if the weather permits the boys will make a good showing before the school term ends.

Some 30 odd boys have been showing up for daily practice which indicates that there will be competition for positions on the team, so keen that several places will probably be filled because of the aspirants ability to wield the bat.

So far workouts have been held in the K. A. A. gymnasium, where throwing for condition and control, bunting and base sliding were practiced. However, three days last week allowed the boys to get out-of-doors. A temporary diamond has been laid out in the meadow near the Big Basin mill where they can practice hitting and base running. The field, though the first to dry-up after each storm, is too spongy for fast work, but will suffice for putting the players into condition while Modoc park is getting dry enough for play.

It is too early in the season to even begin to select a team, but those players which look best in their respective positions are: catcher, Chas. Grove, Delos Mills and Chester Shriver; pitcher, Robert Goetz, Harold Wortley, Vernon Christy and Raymond Hillon; first base, Robert Goetz, Harold Wortley and Chester Shriver; at second and short, Frank Peyton and George Dow seem to have no competition; third, Delos Mills, Clifford Hogue and Pat Montgomery; outfield, Kenneth Maier, Roger Montgomery, Lawrence French, Dean Beckley, Martin Adams, Donald Dickson and Robert Cornish.

What may prove a hard blow to the team, however, will be the loss of Wortley, Peyton, Shriver and Adams. These four have parts in the senior play and unless arrangements can be made so they can come to practice, they will have to drop out.

Manager Leslie Peyton is arranging games with Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass. The latter is the only one heard from and they wish to exchange games. No definite arrangements have been made as yet, for this game as Manager Peyton wishes if possible to play the three Rogue river valley teams on one trip.
