Aided Enlistments

One of the first extra duties imposed upon our branch of the service was to assist the army and navy in ecuring enlistments. In this work the Klamath Falls office made a remarkable record. More recruits for the navy were sent in from this sparsely settled mountain county than from any other office of like size in the district. The record for army and marine enlistments was almost as great. How many extra hours of service was given this duty-and how many miles the old "tin lizzle" covered will never be known, for no record was kept, but there many days when my office was full of recruits, long trips were made to outlying parts of the county and fifteen hour days were the rule rather than the exception for the postmaster.

Five Clerks Employed

On taking charge of the office in 1913, the office was located in the Murdock building between Second and Third streets. Five clerks were d ing the work. Ft. In winter they were without any service except when some one volunteered to come thirty miles through the mountain drifts for the mail.
