SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 6.—The many players in Sacramento's winter baseball league for the season of 1922-23 will have what is believed to be a new form of insurance for amateur ball players. At a recent meeting of the league, which wound up the 1921-22 season, a surplus, which remained after the bushers' ball, was laid aside for insurance purposes. Players who are injured during the games next season will receive insurance which will alleviate to a certain extent financial losses which heretofore have occurred when players were temporarily laid up.

RADIO FOR ALPS

Radio may soon rival the St. Bernard dog as the savior of mountain climbers lost in the Alps.

After twenty years of experimenting, Jean Lacarne, a French engineer, connected with the Vallot observatory on the summit of Mont Blanc, has perfected a radio apparatus capable of resisting the severe atmospheric changes on the high altitudes which break ordinary wireless instruments.

The suggestion is made that climbing parties hereafter carry small wireless outfits so they can obtain quick help through the Mont Blanc observatory if necessary.

RADIO SAVES U. S. MONEY

Radio telegraph "nets" from Washington to the 9th army corps headquarters and camps and stations have

been established by the signal corps during the last two months. It was announced today by the war department, with a resulting reduction by 40 per cent of the official messages previously handled by the commercial wire companies between these points. A saving to the government in wire tolls of approximately \$10,000 a year is expected, it was added.

CHAMBER TO INSTALL

The Portland chamber of commerce is planning installation of a radio receiving and broadcasting set. A committee has been named to make an investigation in the proposed installation and to report to the board of directors. It is proposed to use the radio plant in receiving of evening concerts for the benefit of the members, and also to broadcast speeches of prominent men who appear at functions of the chamber.
