ENTERPRISE NEEDED

There are some people who are always complaining about "hard times." If you urged them to push their business along now, they would point to this or that unpromising condition and say they would wait until the situation clears up. But by the time they were satisfied with the outlook, the opportunity would probably have passed.

There never was a time yet in the history of business, from the days when the first cave men began to swap stone axes for bear traps, when unfavorable conditions could not be found by those who are looking for trouble. Even during the flush times of 1919 and 1920, there were plenty of difficulties in the way of doing business. The people who wait until all the skies are clear, will never make a start.

Folks who are ambitious and reasonably courageous, dig below the surface and see if the main basic conditions are favorable. At the present time they will find three fundamental factors that are most encouraging. These are as follows:

1. A sound currency system. Most of our previous business depressions were created by disturbances in the money system.

2. An abundant supply of loanable capital, at moderate rates. This is sure to encourage enterprise, and all that is needed is some system by which the farmers, whose interests have been neglected, can secure loans on terms similar to those given to other business men.

3. No overstock of goods. The country is consuming faster than it is producing, and there must soon be a big movement of production to fill depleted stocks.

A great many concerns did a bigger business in 1921 than ever before, as the result of a more generous policy toward advertising. They found that if they let people know what they had and told their story with printers' ink, they got all the business they could handle. It is a hopeful time for business enterprise, for all who will push their goods with energy and determination.

ployers that they cannot operate at a profit on the eight-hour day. On the contrary, we are convinced from reports of lumber prices in the West Coast Lumberman, which shows an increase since last August of an average of better than \$3 per thousand, that profits have not necessitated this proposed change in hours. However, we will stand ready to be convinced of error when the Oregon state board of conciliation makes its investigation, starting Monday, if the past records of the operations involved prove their statements. However, we reiterate our former statements that we shall stand firm for the eight-hour day; and, if proven necessary, would

stand a reduction in wages rather than sacrifice the eight-hour principle, which principle is as fundamental to us as life itself."

The resolutions follow:

Whereas: The Timberworkers involved in the strike in this district are in a struggle for the maintenance of the 8 hour day and against the attempt of the employers to establish the 9 and 10 hour day in this industry, and

Whereas: Any attempt of the workers to secure from their employers the rights to maintain the 8 hour day has been met with rebuff and insult to the extent of absolute failure in securing a conference with a view of a presentation of facts in attempt to bring harmonious relations, and

Whereas: In order to be fair, pending conference in attempt to adjust the controversy, the Timberworkers, as is the custom, left the maintenance men in the factories, mills and woods, that is watchmen, firemen and others, with a view of protection from fire and the maintenance of insurance regulations, and

Whereas: The operators in the present controversy over the extension of the hours have, and are, attempting to operate their plants more than 8 hours, and

Whereas: Maintenance men, such as watchmen and firemen, were left at their posts to protect the property, but are in instances being required by their employers to do other work, thus compelling them to act as strike-breakers, and

Whereas: These operators are at this time attempting to operate their woods to gather a supply of logs for their plants involved in the controversy, to further aid them in manufacturing their product on other than an 8 hour basis, therefore be it

Resolved, That each and every operation of whatever nature involved in this 8 hour controversy is hereby declared unfair to the International Union of Timberworkers, Local Union No. 188 of Klamath Falls, Ore., and that no part of any single operation encompassing woods, mills, factories and other parts of the operation, shall be declared fair until the entire controversy is settled; that is, an individual concern must be placed on an 8-hour basis throughout before it can be considered fair, and be it further

Resolved, That all maintenance men, members of our organization, who are now employed in these concerns in any capacity, are hereby ordered to leave their occupations immediately, there being no exceptions to this order whether in woods, factories, mills or other parts of the operations.

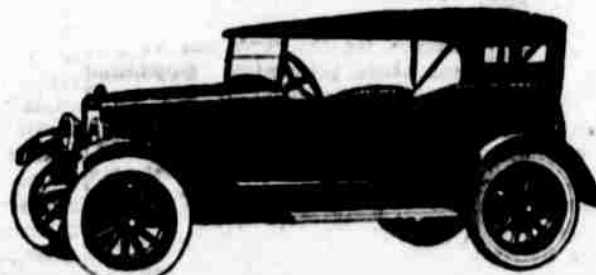
