GREAT BIBLICAL FEATURE. "THE FALL OF BABYLON"

It would seem that "The Fall of Babylon," the latest and by far one of the most notable motion picture masterpieces produced by Griffith, the wizard of the drama, has broken even his own record. Potato Control Complex

Most potato diseases in Oregon cannot be controlled by one measure only, says M. B. McKay, experiment station specialist, in his new bulletin, "Potato Diseases in Oregon and Their Control." Rhizoctonia is cited as an example of complex control. It lives in both seed and ground, so rotation of land

and seed treatment are necessary. Either alone is likely to fail. Perfect control is nearly impossible, as the fungus lives on many other plants, some of them wild. The bulletin tells how to avert most serious losses from this and other diseases.
