SEEK WIDER TRADE

Leading Business Men of Nation to Discuss Subject at Convention

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., April 13.—Ways of developing foreign markets for American goods and setting idle industrial plants to work and ships in motion are among the subjects for discussion at the National Foreign Trade convention to be held here May 10, 11 and 12. Between four and five thousand delegates, representing the industrial, agricultural, commercial, financial and shipping interests of the nation, are expected to attend. Many of the government's foreign trade advisers, some of whom will come from their posts abroad, are on the program for addresses.

One of the big problems to be discussed, it was stated, is how to sell abroad the estimated twenty percent surplus of American production over domestic consumption. This, it was asserted, spells the difference between prosperity for the American farmer, manufacturer, shipper and worker, and business stagnation and unemployment.

One of the general sessions will be devoted to questions relating to taxation and currency. The subjects will include "The Effect of High Taxation on the Exchanges," "The Factor of Depreciated Currency in Competition," and "Why We Must Have Foreign Trade."

MAIL STATION HUGE

Will Have 600 feet of Roof Space for Airplane Landing

CHICAGO, April 13.—The largest and most modern mail station in the world will be opened in Chicago this summer, barring accidents or unforeseen delays.

The building 76 by 800 feet and seven stories high, counting a basement a ground level into which mail cars will run direct from the railroad yards, marks a departure from the usual postoffice practice of building along conventional lines or ornamental architecture. It has been designated as a modern daylight industrial building, and when completed will contain the last word in automatic conveyors and other time and labor saving devices.

Provision has been made for the future growth of the airplane mail service by providing a clear roof space more than 600 feet long where small planes can land with mail transferred from the larger trans-continental flyers at Checker-board Field, Maywood.
