Additional Appropriation Wanted for Road Program for 1923-24

WASHINGTON, April 15 .- Additional appropriations in furthering the program of Federal co-operation with states in the construction of highways are requested in a bill introduced in the house of representafives by Thomas II. Dunn of New

For carrying out the provisions of an Act of 1916, under which the Federal government agrees to assist in the construction of rural post roads. the Dunn bill asks these appropria-

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, \$65,000,000.

. For the fiscal year ending June 30. 1924, \$75,000,000,

For earrying out the provisions of the Federal Highway Act, approved last year, an appropriation of \$6 -500,000 is provided for forest roads and trails.

Allotments of the funds would be made by the Secretary of Agriculture. and it is provided that for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923, these shall not exceed \$12,500 per mile, exclusive of the cost of bridges of more than twenty feet of clear span. Expenditures after that fiscal year by secretary of agriculture could not exread \$10,000 per mile, with the same exception in the case of bridges.
