OREGON HAS 68 UNITS. INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 27.—There has been an increase of 1,919 units in the American Legion auxiliary in the last five months, according to Mrs. Claire P. Thurston of Indianapolis, Marion county council, publicity officer. The number of units throughout the United States, Canal Zone, Cuba, Mexico and Hawaii, now is 4,595, she said. The auxiliary has experienced rapid growth since its origin a little more than two years ago. The first national convention was held in Kansas City last November. Iowa, with 386 units, leads the states in membership, while New York state, with 305, is next, and Minnesota with 297, is third. Astoria effects a saving of \$11,000 in teachers' salaries.
