OUR MORNING MAIL

THE thrill that the editor gets from a session with the morning mail is graphically described in a recent issue of the Bend Press. The scene might as easily be laid in any other newspaper office in the country. With this senseless waste of good white paper going unceasingly on beneath their very noses, is it any wonder that the harassed newspaper men occasionally rise and yell for relief from the high price of news print? The Press depicts the crime of the century, from the newspaper man's viewpoint as follows:

The morning mail to the average country editor is usually an assorted combination of complaints, bills and pleas for free publicity, of which the latter forms the greater part.

Every commission, every board, every division of state and national government that is forced to defend its existence, tries to do it by sending thrilling stories of its activities to the newspapers with release dates and all other ear marks of exclusive stories.

Now comes a real thriller, a veritable scoop from the United States department of agriculture, a story of intense human interest, one calculated to make the hearts of the American people beat faster, to bring their souls into closer attune to the universe.

The story deals with that gripping drama of rural life, "New Ways of Using Lamb." It shows the "housewife" how to cook the festive sheep so that it will taste like something the Turks, Armenians and Syrians serve with garlic or essence of leek.

It is a wonderful story and can be found on page one of the editor's waste paper basket, where it will be read by thousands of microbes.

Here is another: Great black letters on pure white paper, "The Coal Crisis," trying to prove to all the world through the press that there are "more miners than are needed" and the high price of coal is dependent on the men who dig it out of the ground.

Political candidates stand in line with glowing accounts of their incomparable qualifications for the positions they seek. "A magazine of religious freedom" would gain an outlet to its surcharged feelings through the press, and because it refuses to become a mouthpiece for bigotry it is denounced as a heretic.

There are 37 oddly assorted civil service examinations to be held and the commission of pop-passers at Washington "request" that somebody pass the buck of publicity to the editor who, they are certain, is just rearin' to go in giving free notices.

The bureau of census would enjoy seeing every line and every figure of the recent census printed in every newspaper in America. All space forbids! It is a wonderful story, so perfect in detail that to eliminate a dot or word were to ruin the beautiful symmetry of the whole.

The chamber of commerce of the United States is next. The head of the financial department of the chamber has said something and he is asking for America to know it. What he said he alone knows—together with the microbes in the rapidly filling waste paper basket.

Clip sheet No. 200 from the press service of the United States department of agriculture is a veritable mine of hidden wealth of stories, all released under proper state line, all about as exciting as the "begat" chapter in Genesis.

The railroad want lots of things printed, free of course, about rates, rails and rights-of-way. Wonder what they would do if an editor asked them for a mileage book or a map?

Manufacturers of a new popular priced automobile evidently believe that the world is aching to read all about the new flier.

The Canadian Pacific sends weekly a lot of tip-top news that never is printed.

Occasionally an O. A. C. item gets by the editor, because a world's record is again broken by some Oregon hen, but the most of it goes to the office cat.

This is but a glimpse of the average morning mail of the average country editor.

Some mathematically inclined pencil pusher some day is going to figure out the cost sheets of this deluge and he will find that the nation is spending \$1,461,343.75 annually to get something printed without paying for it, and that the entire space donated by gullible editors totals \$1.37 at regular rates, less 15 per cent agent's discount and 2 per cent for cash.

The crepes are perhaps most popular just now, though satin is always liked. Moire—a lovely new moire, supple, soft and as light as a this silk—is also creeping to the front this spring, and may be worn more and more, even into the summer, though chiffon always has its best season then.
