WORTH TRYING

TO NINE out of ten republican voters in Klamath county we venture to say that the name of Ralph Williams means nothing at all. Yet for fourteen years Williams has been the Oregon member of the national republican committee, the voice and vote of Oregonians in national political affairs.

Fourteen years of non-accomplishment have worn the patience of Oregon business men, and this year Williams is opposed for reelection by O. H. Fithian, Portland merchant, whose platform has a ring of promise.

A national committeeman can be far more than a figurehead, and Fithian promises, if elected, that he will do certain definite things for the development of Oregon.

Klamath county is especially interested in his promise to secure war finance corporation aid for farmers and stockmen.

The opposing platforms are contrasted in a recent article by Henry M. Hansen, political editor of the Portland Telegram, and a comparison of his analysis with the official platforms submitted by the candidates to the secretary of state, shows that Hansen has stuck to the record in measuring the merits of the men. This is his summing-up: Fithian is a progressive republican and is seeking the office on a constructive platform promising party loyalty, and faithful public service to the state.

Williams is a reactionary, and is seeking re-election on a political platform promising merely party service. Fithian promises to "loyally support the principles of the Republican party," and also to conscientiously labor to advance Oregon's industrial, agricultural and financial interests.

Williams promises "to champion those principles for which the republican party stands," and there his platform stops.

Fithian's conception of the duties of national committeeman is twofold—loyalty to his party, but ever and above all service to the people.

Williams' conception of the duties of a national committeeman is purely political—fidelity to party, and its organization.

Fithian promises "to work in harmonious co-operation with Oregon's delegation in congress."

Williams has never worked in harmony with the delegation, and makes no promise in his platform that he will endeavor to do so in the future.

Fithian promises to do his utmost to assist the Oregon delegation to obtain legislation for the relief of Oregon's farmers, and livestock men.

Williams has never lifted a finger to aid either of them, and promises nothing for them in his platform.

Fithian promises to aid the Oregon delegation to secure for Oregon farmers their just share of loans from the war finance corporation.

Williams has never offered to aid them, and in his platform makes no pledges along that line for the future.

Fithian favors a nation-wide presidential primary.

Williams is silent on that all important political issue in his platform.

Fithian declares himself "heartily in favor" of "prompt" and "just recognition of all war veterans."

Williams is also silent on this great issue of human rights now pending before congress.

Fithian favors "equal rights for women within the republican party."

Williams' platform is also silent on this big political question.

ASK TONGUE TO QUIT

Charges Made Against Chairman of Republican Central Committee

PORTLAND, May 5.—Charging that Thomas H. Tongue, chairman of the republican state central committee has violated "the principles of the republican party" and "the American spirit of fair play," by using the power of his organization, to elect Ralph E. Williams as national committeeman, republicans from all sections of the state have forwarded to Tongue a petition asking him to resign and that the committee elect a neutral chairman to succeed him.

O. H. Fithian is a candidate against Williams and the petition charges that Tongue is signing as chairman of the committee for literature issued for Williams and is trying to whip the committee machinery into line for Williams.
