Perkins vs. Producers

Deposition of Rufus S. Moore, of San Francisco, California, was received by the clerk of the court this morning in the case of W. E. Perkins against the Producers' Milk association, involving \$2335.90, in two separate counts, for alleged non-payment of a contract for purchase of equipment, and for the purchase of dairy products.

Unless by special stipulation the deposition will remain sealed and opened in open court at the time of the trial, which has not yet been definitely set.
