## TODAY'S FASHIONS

COLORS AND FABRICS COMBINED  
One Color Doesn't Make Summer Costume; Many Combinations Shown in New York

One color doesn't make a summer costume. No, and one fabric doesn't, either. "In union there is strength" is the fashionable slogan for summer.

One delightful and typical costume seen in a New York shop was made of gray raline striped with black and canary yellow. Its long cape was lined with canary colored voile and the same material was used for the blouse that accompanied the sleeveless slip-on. The sketches show you other ways in which two fabrics have but a single thought.

Two colors of the same fabric may also be combined with excellent results. Paisley patterned silks are shown with plain colors and so are striped with checked raffles and glinghams. Where plain colors are used together with popular combinations are black and red, beige and red, tan and brown, sand and navy and two shades of gray.

#### FASHION NOTES

Easter flew in on magic wings, and with nothing more than a waving of her Springtime wand conjured a spreading rainbow of gowns and hats and flowers for the lovely ladies of this land. The best part of it is that the rainbow is guaranteed to remain throughout the spring and summer.

The brightest color, of course, is red. But in this particular, rainbow it runs to all sorts of shades from the highpower flame to the most delicate shade of shell-pink. "Sealing-wax," "lipsteak," "pigeon-blood," "bonfire" and "cardiac" are the names of some of the most fashionable variations of what psychologists call the life-color.

Periwinkle remains popular. This, too, varies. Sometimes it is almost blue and sometimes nearer lavender. When it is used for hats it is trimmed very effectively with lilac blossoms.

Bright shades of blue are specially favored. King blue appears in satins and other shiny materials and looks like shimmering flares of electricity. Navy is the standard shade for suits and coats and for the new taffeta dresses.



Yellow and orange seem to promise a vogue they haven't enjoyed for years. The most popular trimming to-day on hats of all colors is very natural looking nasturtium blossoms. Marigolds are seen frequently and yellow waterlilies.
