STANDS FOR LAW

ATTEMPTS of the Ku Klux Klan to create the impression that its "principles" find favor in the eyes of legitimate fraternal organizations has met with a stinging set-back in the action of Samuel E. Burke, grand master of the Masonic order in California.

In a communication to all lodges within his jurisdiction Burke repudiates in the name of Masonry the pretensions of the "invisible empire," and says flatly that he will hold to strict accounting any member of a California lodge of Masons who seeks to usurp the functions of the laws of the land.

This "invisible empire" pretends that its chief purpose is to aid in the enforcement of the law of the land; but its practical workings appear to be to interfere with the orderly and lawful administration of the processes of our courts and the duly constituted officers of the law; a society which stalks and strikes in the dark, under cover of masks; an organization which is so un-American and un-Masonic in its methods as to merit the disapproval of thoughtful, law-abiding, order-loving men.

It has been charged that members of our fraternity have in some instances become allied with this Ku Klux Klan; that night riders who usurp the lawful processes of the courts, and who whip and scourge and tar those under penalty of their decrees, are Masons. The Grand Master does not believe such stories to be true.

He will hold all those of our honorable fraternity domiciled within the State of California, or who are members of the California lodges, to a strict accountability for any attempted usurpation of the law of the land.

Free Masonry stands for law and order and decent government. It stands for the United States of America, the best government ever devised by man. It stands now and always and openly for the orderly conduct of society and for the upholding of the lawful and regular administration of the legal processes of our courts.

TO THE PEOPLE OF KLAMATH COUNTY

A MESSAGE

There is an issue today before the people of Klamath county that directly concerns every business and every citizen. The future as well as the stability of the great lumber and milling industries is at stake

The curtailment of a vast output of lumber products, totaling millions of dollars, as well as a payroll of \$6,000,000, is involved. There must be a decision soon, and upon that decision depends the immediate revival of a stagnant business and the future prosperity and development of Klamath county.

A little more than ten years ago the manufacture of lumber in the Klamath district was an infant enterprise. Today it is the county's leading industry. As it grew our community expanded and prospered. With more than usual community pride the lumber operators have expended their best efforts to give Klamath an industrial asset that would enable her to rise to her proper place in the commonwealth.

Today the operators are face to face with the alternative of surrendering their rights as free agents, or to get out of business. All because, in the readjustment of affairs, they found it necessary to adopt the nine-hour working day.

The operators are not opposed to the eight-hour day. The shortness of the working season and the fact that their nearest and most powerful competitors are operating on a ten-hour basis have forced them to this expedient. Last year, owing to unfavorable market conditions, most of the plants in this district were able to run only at half capacity. Some of the smaller ones were forced to close and a number passed into the hands of their creditors. It was inevitable that a readjustment must come to avoid calamity.

The operators found that they were losing business where they were facing competition based on a ten-hour day at wages less than those paid here. The ten-hour clause prevails in the lumber regions in all the northern states from and including Montana eastward, the central section, and all the large producing areas in the southern states. It is a fair estimate to say that from 80 to 85 percent of all lumber is produced out of a ten-hour working day.

California, by reason of her great fruit industry, is our great local market. Our California competitors first have an advantage of a hundred miles or so. Another handicap against the Klamath mills is an additional charge for freight over that paid by the California mills. Practically every white pine mill and box factory in California is running on ten hours. And against these uphill conditions the Klamath operators are declared to be unfair by some because they ask for a nine-hour day in order to meet this competition.

Since the mills have been closed great amounts of money have been taken out of circulation. Every day from now on that the mills remain closed means an additional loss of thousands of dollars to the business of this community.

Citizens of Klamath county, we have briefly reviewed the situation so far as it concerns the lumber industry. Our interests are mutual. Do you want your city to advance? Do you want your business to grow? Will you give support to a movement that strikes at the very root of your greatest industry?
