WHY DOCTORS ORDER TURNIPS. With a better and clearer understanding of the principles of hygienic diet which requires a supply of fresh vegetables (in year around, the turnip, formerly almost exclusively grown as a fall and winter crop, now takes an important place as an early summer vegetable and is sown in the spring with other early vegetables instead of as a fall crop exclusively. It is put in during July, usually as a succession to peas or early string beans.

much more delicate in flavor than when they have reached full maturity and with no chance for them to be pithy or woody. The turnips do not like hot weather any more than do their close relatives, the radishes, and the seed should be put in the ground about the same time as the radishes. They stand considerable frost without harm. By an early planting a crop of young turnips will be ready for the table by the time the follow crop for fall consumption or for winter storage is ready to be planted.

For tenderness, they require good cultivation and to be kept going at top speed for the early crop. The later crop does not require the same attention as the plants grow more slowly and attain greater size. They will be hastened, however, with careful cultivation in order to conserve the moisture in the soil. During long dry spells, the young plants remain practically at a standstill and make the bulk of their growth during the cooler days of fall. The turnip, like the cabbage, demands rich soil for its best development. Include some of the newer and finer types of turnip in your early planting plan. They will be very acceptable just as the earlier vegetables are on the wane and furnish a transition between the early and midsummer crops.
