



CHICAGO, May 22 .- The national yark anson heray with the opening of Mesa Verde national park May 1, and will close with the closing of that park November 1, according to advices received here by railroad officers. The Mesa Verde park, besides being the first of the national parks named in the advices to open, will be the last of them to close.

Crater Lake national park, the last of them to open, will start "e ceiving travelers July 1, and close September 30." Opening and closindates of nine other national parks ware given ag follows:

Zion, May 15 to October 15; Sequoia, May 2 to October 10; General Grant, May 1 to October 10; Wind Cave, June 1 to September 30: Lassen Volcano, June 1 to September 15; Yellowstone, June 15 to September 15; Rocky Mountain. June 15 to October 1; Mount Ranier, June 15 to September 15; Glacier, June 15 to September 15.


INSTALL MUD PUMP Another Effort Will Be Made to Check Water in Siemens Well

Work will be resumed at the Siemens well with the installation of a mud hog, a pump used to force mud down through the casing and up into the crevices, thus shutting off the flow of water. The pump has arrived here, and will be delivered at the well at once, according to Neil Campbell, driller,

Activities at the well were suspended in November, when all efforts to check the water failed. Coment was ineffective. Campbell said, because of the depth of the crevices. With the mud pump high pressure will be used to force mud into the crevices until they are completely filled, when cement will be used to seal off the water. The pump is attached to the top of the casing and power is supplied by the steam plant.
