Governor's Secretary Says Race Conceded to Governor

Olcott is conceded the nomination by from 500 to 1,000 votes, according to Governor Olcott's secretary, who was reached by telephone at 2:10 this afternoon. He said virtually all the state was in with the exception of a few Eastern Oregon counties, which were expected to increase Olcott's lead. Olcott was ahead 75 votes at that time, he said.

PORTLAND, May 22.—A tabulation of 21 counties complete and 15 incomplete at 2:30 today gave Hall 42,278, Olcott 42,403, a lead of 125 for Olcott, compared with a lead of 85 in the last preceding compilation.

PORTLAND, May 22.—(By Associated Press)—Seeing back and forth, the lead for the republican nomination for governor swung between Hall and Olcott today.

A compilation early this afternoon from 20 complete counties gave Olcott 85 lead. Olcott 42,367, Hall 42,282.

Olcott carried Benton, Deschutes, Hood River, Klamath, Linn, Marion, Morrow, Sherman, Wasco, Washington and Yamhill. Hall carried Clackamas, Columbia, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Josephine, Lane, Multnomah and Crook.

Of counties whose returns are incomplete Hall is expected to carry Clatsop, Umatilla and Tillamook. Olcott is expected to carry Baker, Gillman, Grant, Harney, Jackson, Jefferson, Lake, Lincoln, Malheur, Polk, Union, Wallowa and Wheeler.

The result may not be known until an official canvass, which will be made by the secretary of state within 30 days after election, unless the latest returns give a more definite lead for either candidate.

PORTLAND, May 22.—Tabulation at noon today from 18 complete and 18 incomplete counties gave Hall 43,325, Olcott 42,246, giving Hall a lead of 79.

Two American women, Mrs. M. L. Sibley and Miss V. M. Boyer, addresses unknown, are among the missing.

Crater Lake national park, the last of them to open, will start receiving travelers July 1, and close September 30. Opening and closing dates of nine other national parks were given as follows:

- Zion, May 15 to October 15; Sequoia, May 2 to October 10; General Grant, May 1 to October 10; Wind Cave, June 1 to September 30; Lassen Volcano, June 1 to September 15; Yellowstone, June 15 to September 15; Rocky Mountain, June 15 to October 1; Mount Ranier, June 15 to September 15; Glacier, June 15 to September 15.

Will Be Operated This Season by Mrs. Watson of Santa Barbara

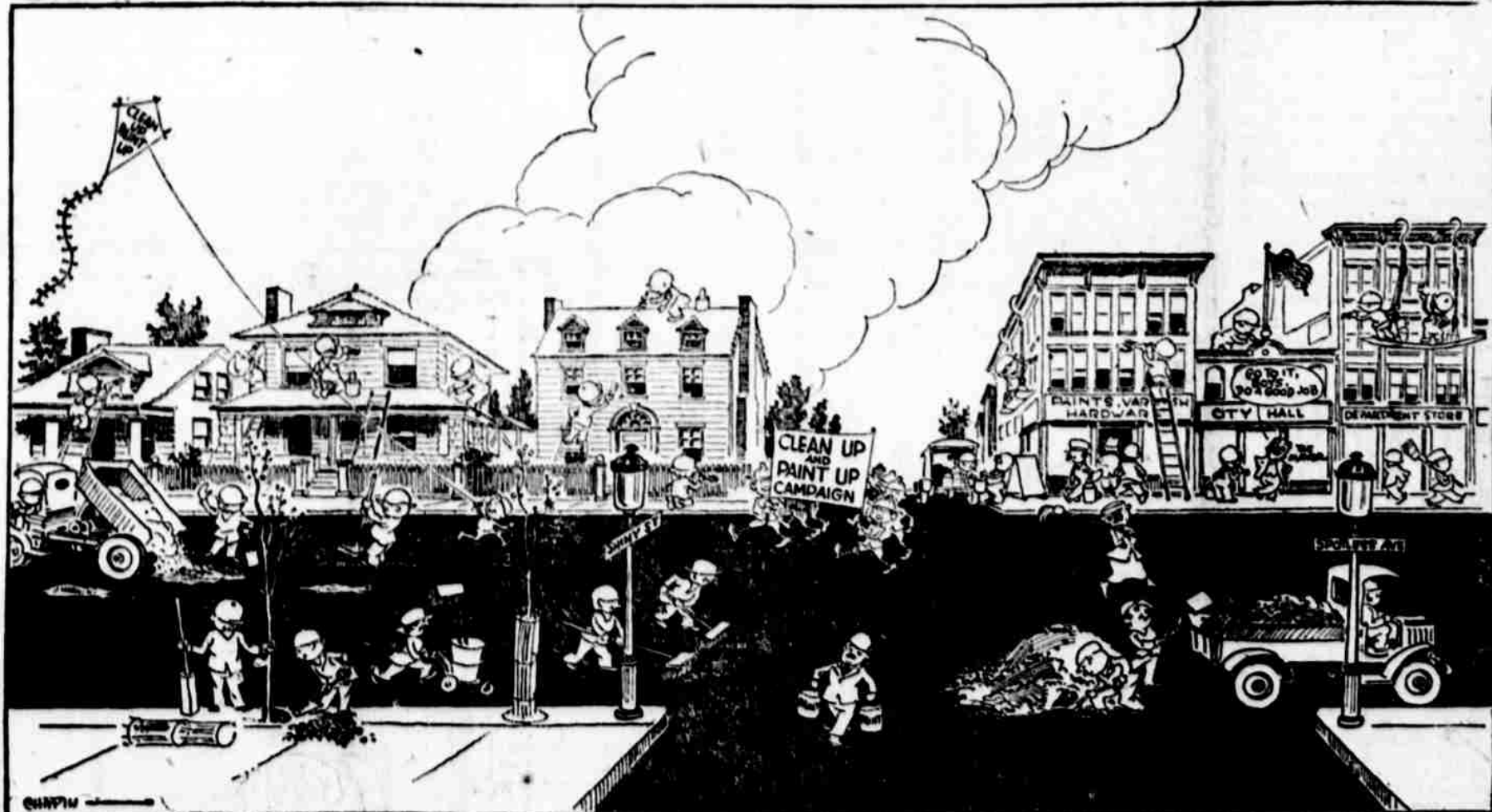
