

PLAYGROUND TO OPEN

Exercises Will Be Held Tomorrow Afternoon; Special Music

The children's playground, located on the Main street court house grounds, will be dedicated, opened for inspection and turned over to the supervisor at the exercises tomorrow afternoon at 2:30.

The playground, when completed will be one of the most modern in the state, and every piece is of first class material. There are nine different parts of the equipment, including the sand pile for the little tots.

Special music is being arranged through the Harry Boral orchestra and the Kings band, and other exercises besides public speaking will be held. Immediately after the exercises the children will be given access to the grounds, where a supervisor will look after them.

A playground association has been created by the chamber of commerce to maintain and supervise the ground, with the committee being designated as the board of directors for the first year. Mrs. H. M. Ackley is chairman of the board, which includes besides the chairman, M. S. West, president of the chamber of commerce, Mrs. H. W. Poole, Mrs. O. Peyton, F. A. Baker and Mrs. C. S. Curran.

Mary McCormack will supervise the playgrounds until the close of school, when Miss Ruth Dixon, now teaching at Mills school, will take over the work as the permanent supervisor. Miss McCormack will begin her work tomorrow noon, and will be at the playground every afternoon from 2 until 5 o'clock. When school is out morning hours will be regulated for the benefit of the children.
