THE RIGHT MOVE

ORGANIZED effort in any direction always gets results. The revival of republican party spirit in Klamath county, evidenced by the enthusiasm of the central committee meeting last night, therefore spells progress for the majority party in Klamath county.

Until some better system than government by party is discovered, the party system will stand. Regardless of which of the dominant American parties has held control in times of crisis, the ship of state has come through safely.

Great men have arisen in both parties when times demanded great men. And before the existing parties were conceived through the stress of the times that demanded change, there were great leaders of great party organizations.

It may be that the new issues that face the American people today will create new party alignments. America will always be governed through party division. For ourselves, we know of no sounder general platform than the basic doctrine of the republican party. We may have to take cognizance of new issues, exert the party power in new directions, but there is no reason apparent for the abandonment of the old organization.

If reforms are needed they can come from within. The highest intelligence, the staunchest integrity of the nation is represented in the ranks of republicanism.

Forward-looking citizens are beginning to see that the weakening of party spirit has been a bad thing for the nation. Blame is being placed upon the direct primary, the recall, the referendum and the initiative for the lack of organized interest in affairs political.

We have been a ship without a pilot, a regiment without a staff, each man a law unto himself in things political. Many realize the mistake and the whole nation is beating back, or on the verge of beating back, to the old and tried systems.

In this period of political readjustment strange things may come about, but in any event organized effort, the maintenance of a central association through which political ideas can be exchanged is a good and wholesome thing.

We are gratified to see such a strong nucleus of republican organization formed in Klamath county.

WRITERS EXPRESS VIEWS ON
CHILD LABOR

Editor Herald—In the Eight-Hour Special I had a scathing poem on the scab. The young people at present working in the factories are in a somewhat different class. One cannot hold them morally responsible, or help feeling that they will come out of the experience with a certain peculiar twist to their moral viewpoint.

Now what they can accomplish can have very little effect on the labor situation, but just as a matter of curiosity, I am interested in the mental processes of the parents who in some cases, it is said, compelled them to work, and in others encouraged them.

The type of parent I have in mind is not the one who is obliged to make his son earn money during his vacation (though even so he could find other jobs for him) but who, if the boy were offered a rare opportunity for a pleasure trip in some one's private car, could afford to let him go and give him some spending money besides.

It seems strange, because as a rule, no matter how many compromises a man is willing to make with his own conscience, he usually has at least comparatively high ideals for his children. The man who drinks, or is lax in his private conduct, is by no means anxious to see his son follow in his footsteps, but the man who is always following the almighty dollar at any cost seems to think that the kindest thing he can do for his boy is to teach him as early as possible to do so and do likewise.

It is a curious thing that a respected citizen can take this stand while an out-and-out crook often declares beyond everything that his son shall be upright and honest.

Wack Wallingford says to young Jimmy: "It has been the dream of my life that my son should be a respected and honored citizen of the community," the boy retorts, "Then you begin one generation too late." But in his heart must he not have had more respect for his father than as if he had tried to work him on his schemes and windles?

You cannot use children in an endeavor to break a strike where men and women are struggling for their just rights, without its having some effect on the children themselves. The child who is not injured can only be saved by his own natural wholesomeness.

Some of the parents will get their punishment when, like the man who created a monster which he could not control, they find that they have developed in their children a greed for the material things of life, a selfishness and indifference to the rights of others, which it is beyond their power to subdue.
