AMERICAN SHEEPMEN AS PICTURESQUE AS COWBOYS

With the beautiful hills and dales of Wyoming as a background and enormous flocks of grazing sheep adding to the artistic effects of many of his scenes, Alvin Neitz, author and director of spectacular motion pictures, has illustrated in a striking manner his contention that American authors have neglected to take advantage of one of the most picturesque figures in American history by weaving their romances around the cowboys and excluding the sheepmen.

"The American sheepman must not be confused with the sheepmen of other countries. He is very much the same type of red-blooded American as the cowboy, working under the same skies in the same vast country, and he has naturally developed much along the same broad lines. FARM POINTERS

Solution for Cabbage Maggot: Corrosive sublimate 1 to 1000—that is, 1 ounce to 12 gallons of water—applied at the rate of one-half cup about the base of cabbage, cauliflower and similar plants, will give effective control for root maggots. Three applications should be made at 10-day intervals.

Dodder Killed by Burning: Dodder patches in alfalfa fields should be carefully cut out before haymaking (time as the mower sickle often carries the dodder to new places in the field. After cutting, the patch may be sprinkled with crude oil and kerosene and burned, as that is the best way to make sure of the death of the parasite.
