MORE LAWSUITS

HE answer recently filed in the courthouse case by the county court, and the preparations being made for trial of this suit, is notice that this chronic trouble is to be perpetated. The trail in the lower court and an appeal to the supreme court will mean at least another year and a half of the litigation. And the attorneys for the county court indicate that a procedure will be commenced against the Klamath Development Company to secure title to Block 10 of the Hot Springs tract. ting. This will duplicate the other litigation in time and expense.

The Herald had hoped for a different course. There seemed to be a chance that the courthouse trouble might end by a dismissal of the guit and an arrangement made to take over the Hot Springs structure for high school purposes. The Herald has reliable assurances that this may be done, should the suit be dismissed, but should the company be forced into expensive litigation to protect its rights it would not feel under any particular obligation to favor the county in the matter.
