## Melhase vs. Herlthy

Suit to quiet title on two and six-tenths acres in section seven, township 39, Klamath county, was filed this morning by Gus Melhase against Stephen and Ellen Herlthy, in which it is sought to oust the Herlthys from the premises, which Melhase contends they have wrongfully possessed since April 15, 1919. Melhase asks \$1000 in damages for being deprived of the premises, and \$500 for rents and profits accruing during the past two years.

## First National Bank vs. F.M. Gordon

Order confirming sale of lands in the northern part of the county was signed yesterday by Judge Leavitt in the case of the First National bank against Fred M. Gordon. According to the sheriff's return the amount obtained by the sale was \$487.72.

## Henderson vs. Bratton

Attachment suit was filed this morning by H. W. Henderson, as purchaser of a note from the Klamath Packing company, against G. W. Bratton of the Sanitary market, seeking collection of a promissory note for \$1,050 as the balance due. The complaint also asks for \$200 attorney fees.

## IRRIGATION OF KLAMATH LANDS

(Continued from Page 1)

The United States reclamation service canals. Two thousand three hundred acres of this area are to be irrigated by lifting the water 29 feet, and 1756 acres by lifting the water 54 feet. The estimated cost of the reclamation works is about \$100,000, and the district is asking for the approval of the plans and the certification of bonds.

The Shasta View irrigation district lies immediately east of the Malin district, and will also secure its water from the canals of the United States reclamation service, from which the water will be diverted by pumps. Nine hundred and thirty-four acres are to be irrigated under a 25-foot lift, 1810 acres under a 70-foot lift, and approximately 800 acres under a 105-foot lift. However, the district at the present time contemplates constructing only the two lower units at an estimated cost of approximately \$40,000. A considerable area of land in the district is now being dry farmed, and some fruit has been produced without irrigation. The district is asking for the approval of plans and the certification of bonds.

### Bonds Are Voted

The Patterson irrigation district is located in the same vicinity and contains a total area of 1687 acres, which is also to be irrigated with water secured from the United States reclamation service canals by means of pumping. Two hundred and sixty-one acres are to be irrigated under a 25-foot lift, 1123 acres under an 85-foot lift and 303 acres under a 115-foot lift. It is expected that that project will be built in units, and it is contemplated to construct the two lower lifts at this time, at an estimated cost of \$25 per irrigable acre. Ninety-five per cent of the lands have been dry-farmed for a number of years.

In addition to the above estimated costs on the Malin, Shasta View and Patterson districts, a contract will be executed by the district and the United States reclamation service for certain payments made to the reclamation service for the use of the government canals.

The Willow valley irrigation district is also located in Klamath county east of Bonanza, and includes an area of approximately 2000 acres of land. The construction work will consist mainly of a reservoir for storage of 4000 acre feet of the waters of East Fork of Lost river. The district is asking for the approval of plans and has voted bonds in the amount of \$30,000 for construction work.

### FARM POINTERS

**Arsenate Gets the Saw-Flly**  
A spray of arsenate of lead, 2 pounds to 100 gallons, on the foliage of loganberries and raspberries is needed now where saw-flies are prevalent. An angle nozzle is necessary to reach the under surfaces of the leaves. To determine if the pest is present before considerable damage results, examine the newer foliage now for small shot-like holes in the leaves. A careful examination of such leaves will show a small, light green, spiny, caterpillar, rather hard to detect when young.

### Cane Maggots, at Work

New tender shoots of raspberry and loganberry are frequently found with their tops blighted and curled down in characteristic "limberneck" fashion. A closer examination of the injured cane will reveal a bluish girdle just under the bark at the base of the blighted tip. Cutting into the interior will often show the culprit—a small whitish maggot within the pith. Infected canes should be cut out well below the girdle and destroyed as no spray or treatment known at present is effective against this insect.
