For judgment against the said defendants, F. G. Anthony and E. S. Beall for the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, with interest on said sum from the 26th day of March, A. D. 1918, at the rate of six per cent per annum; for the additional sum of One Hundred Dollars as Attorney's fees, and for the further sum of One Hundred and Nine Dollars and Sixty-two cents, with interest on the said sum from the seventeenth day of March, A. D. 1922, at the rate of six per cent per annum, and for its costs and disbursements herein.

And for the decree of this Court, foreclosing the mortgage described in the complaint filed in the above entitled suit, which mortgage is upon the following described real property, to-wit:
