U. S. INSURANCE DRIVE

Veterans' Bureau Plans Drive in Klamath Falls June 12-17

PORTLAND, Ore. June 9 .- For the purpose of haring every ex-service man in Klamath Falls protected by government insurance, an intensive drive to secure applications for veterans' insurance amounting to at least \$50,000 will be held there June 12 to 17 inclusive, according to Kenneth L. Cooper, manager of the United States veterans' bureau

This amount, if secured, will help swell the state's insurance total, the goal to be striven for being \$2,000,-000, he stated. The campaign is limited to the Pacific northwest district of the veterans' bureau and it is expected that more than \$5,000,000 in war risk insurance will be reinstated or converted by veterans during the week beginning June 12.

PREVIOUS YEAR

Heavy Crops Forecast by Department; Winter Wheat Shows Gain

WASHINGTON, June 9 .- Larger rops than last year were forecast today by the department of agriculture. Winter wheat showed an improvement to the extent of 22,000,-999 bushels since May 1st with a forecast of 607,000,000 bushels, the fourth largest ever ghown. The spring wheat area is 1,000,000 acres less than last year but the production forecast is 247,000,000 bushels. or 32,000,000 bushels over the 1921

Vegetables grown in the United States in 1921 had an estimated value of \$1,104,000,000. This was 15.7 per cent of the total value of all crops. The products of market gardens, which may or may not have peen productive enough to be farms within the census definition, are not included in these estimates.

The total value of truck vegetables produced for sale, often called the commercial crop, was estimated by the department at \$227,000,000.

mated value of \$405,000,000 in 1912. The value of the vegetable crop in relation to prominent single crops and to groups of crops has some striking ratios for 1921, a year when the value of the large crops were low the department pointed out. The total value of the vegetable crop for 1921 was 85 per cent of the value of the great corn crop; it was almost as large as the value of the hay and forage crops: it was nearly one-healf as large as the value of the dairy products; it was considerably larger than the value of all poultry property; 46 per cent larger than the value of the winter and spring wheat
