MINE GUARD KILLED
Two Others Wounded in Clash at Utah Mine; Martial Law

SALT LAKE CITY, June 14—A mine guard named Webb was shot and H. P. Lewis, general manager of the Standard Fuel company of Standarville, Utah, and an unidentified Greek miner were wounded today when a train carrying new miners were fired upon by men in ambush. Governor Stubey ordered the national guard mobilized. He also issued a proclamation declaring martial law in the Carbon county coal district.

R. R. PARLEY RESUMES

Conductor and Trainmen to Meet Executives Friday

CHICAGO, June 14.—Negotiations over wages and working conditions will be resumed between conductors and trainmen and executives at the Western Railroad conference at Chicago Friday, called to reopen the matter.

CINCINNATI, O., June 14.—G. M. Jewell, head of the Railway Employees department of the American Federation of Labor, denied emphatically today that the railway shop crafts union have under consideration a plan to move their headquarters from Chicago to Canada to escape any suits brought against them under the Cordonado decision recently handed down by the United States supreme court. "We have no such move under consideration, and I have heard no talk among our leaders of doing such a thing," Jewell said.

"We are not running away from any fight. We are not seeking a fight, but if we are forced into one we will battle to the last ditch."

LUMBER WAGE RAISE

Spokane and Bend Saw Mills Are Affected by New Schedule

SPOKANE, Wash., June 1.—An advance of 5 cents an hour, the first wage increase for more than two years, was voted by the directors of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen for districts 9 and 10, comprising eastern Washington and northern Idaho, at a meeting here. The increase, which affects mill employees only, will fix the minimum wage for common labor at \$2.40 a day, instead of \$2, as at present.

BEND, June 14.—A wage increase to go into effect on June 16 at both the Brooks-Scanlon and Shevlin-Hixon mills advancing the rate of pay 25 cents per day was announced here, following a meeting with the conference committee of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen.
