The HOME GARDEN

What is Home without a Garden?

Sweet Pea Secrets

Everybody wants sweet peas. No annual gives more beautiful flowers for cutting and this plant is particularly useful for cutting. It makes a beautiful display for a time but its real value is to provide bouquets for the house.

No one can have sweet peas without giving them an extra start. They will not endure hot, dry weather and flourish. Consequently they must be planted early. If the ground is workable in March they should be put in, planting them deeply, say about two inches.

It is much surer and safer to plant them in pots or boxes or in a cold frame for an early start. The paper flower pots of small size which can be very cheaply purchased or the paper drinking cups which can be had at a small outlay are ideal for starting the individual plants, pricking holes in the water cups for drainage. They may be started at any time now and it is a good plan to have some light sticks seven or eight inches long if they must be kept indoors or under glass for some time upon which the tiny plants may start to climb. Otherwise they become hopelessly entangled and almost impossible to transplant to permanent quarters.

Sweet pea growers are with great difficulty weaned from the habit of thick planting of the seed, much the same as with the garden pea. The idea of spacing the individual plants, six inches apart is hard to convey to an old-fashioned gardener yet one season's experiment with the plants so spaced, the soil being thoroughly enriched and a good supply of moisture supplies, shows the advantage in the greatly increased vigor of the vine, size of the stem and height to which it will climb to say nothing of larger and more numerous flowers per plant.

These little pots may be placed in a cold frame for an early start, or started in the kitchen window in limited quantities. Soil for sweet peas cannot be too rich. One element is necessary, that is plenty of humus—decayed vegetable matter, to retain moisture. When the ground dries out, the life of the pea is limited. Dryness tends to make the vine an easy victim to red spiders, the whole plant turning gray and dying.

CONFERENCE OF POWERS OPENS AT THE HAGUE

recognition of Soviet Russia unless the government of Moscow conformed to the principles of safety of life, recognition of firm guarantees of private properties, the sanctity of a contract and the right of free labor. Until these things were established and carried out, Mr. Hoover said he held with Secretary of State Hughes that there could be no productivity in Soviet Russia.

France, early in June, in a memorandum to the powers concerned, demanded that the Soviet Russian government withdraw its memorandum presented at the Genoa conference May 11 as a condition for French participation at The Hague. This note of May 11, presented to the powers at Genoa, declared the Soviet repudiation of Russia's national debts and international obligations and refused to establish the bases of security regarded as fundamentally necessary for the restoration of productivity in Russia; it also claimed heavy financial damages for the participation of the allies in military operations against the Soviet regime.

The French government set forth certain arguments strikingly similar to those which earlier had come out of Washington. Premier Poincaré declared the reconstruction of Russia depended upon the revival of agricultural production and this, he said, could not be obtained without a change in regime that would assure the peasants the proceeds of their labor. M. Poincaré referred specifically to the attitude of the Soviet government with respect to its refusal to restore the property of foreigners; to indemnify owners for damages sustained; or recognize the Russian debt. This debt, he said, should be treated on the same basis as the debts of the allies when a settlement was reached, provided Russia had agreed to the same conditions as the allies, but there was no reason to accord Russia exceptional treatment in reducing her war debt, as had been suggested at Genoa.

Representatives of all the powers present at Genoa, with the exception of Russia and Germany, have been invited to The Hague.
