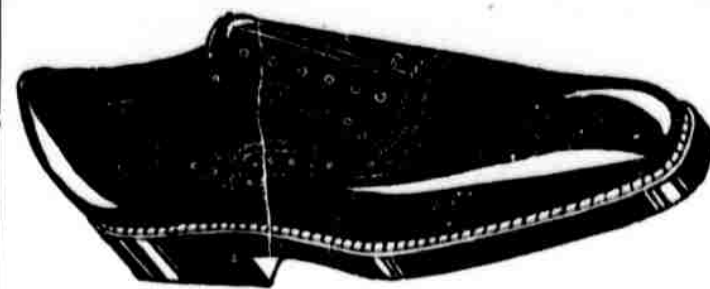

State vs. Head

Case of State against Sam Head, charged with possession of two quart bottles of moonshine liquor opened in the circuit court this morning as the first case of the criminal docket. Up to noon six jurors had been selected out of 13 called: S. A. White, J. J. Horton, Pete Greggs, E. M. Hammond, and J. D. Chambers. The regular panel of jurymen having been exhausted, and after stipulation of counsel to waive the provision of the law that all jurymen must come from the regular panel, Judge Leavitt issued an order for a special venire of 10 jurors for this case. At the same time the judge instructed the clerk to fill up vacancies caused by the excusing of jurymen having a statutory claim of exemption from duty, which was eight.
