HATRED'S FRUIT

MANGLED bodies lying in the broiling sun; dying men asking for a cup of water in their Maker's name; other men—oh, the pity and shame of it—women, mocking their agony and thrusting back with bare steel those who would have been merciful.

In Russia, perhaps, was this horrible scene enacted—or in India or China or Ireland?

No, indeed! In the United States of America, and in one of the most advanced states of the union, Illinois, the home of Abraham Lincoln, the greatest apostle of freedom, and scores of other leaders of national progress.

Not in the sudden flaming of the coal mine war to the heights of hatred where men seize weapons and slay each other lies the worst of it. Circumstances might, when passion is roused, lead many a man to slay.

But hanging dead bodies, dragging men to death behind automobiles, gloating over the agony of the dying—what terrible forces of underlying hatred these things betray.

From this distance it is hard to tell what brought about this horrible catastrophe, which must cause every true American to bow his head in shame that such a sacrilege against the American spirit of freedom could take place on American soil.

There has been unfairness somewhere. That is the root from which hatred springs in labor controversies. Perhaps the mine operators have been oppressive in their treatment of the miners. Reports of government and private investigators bear out this view.

Radical and unreasonable leaders on the union side may have to share the blame when an inquiry has disclosed all the facts.

Doubtless state and federal governments will make full investigation. When the blame is placed punishment should follow. In the production of a commodity so vital to the country as coal there should be no difficulty in fixing prices so that all may profit. If capitalistic greed is at the bottom of this grim business, let the government expose and eradicate the cause.

There must be deep suffering and jobs must be vital to the very existence of workmen and their families, when men and women are driven to such fiendish practices as disgraced America yesterday.

All the material wealth of this nation cannot efface the stain of such spiritual degradation.

And, after all, right there is the point of it all. Men cannot be compelled by all the laws that men can pass to do right if the will to do right is not inherent in each individual.

In the past fifty years there has been great material progress, but our moral and spiritual advancement has not kept pace.

Our industrial system, all the machinery for the production and distribution of wealth has been revolutionized. Transportation and communication methods have been im-

proved immeasurably. Mighty engines for destruction and aggression are at our command. The whole business of living has become complicated by these material advancements.

But there is a grave question as to whether, in view of the correspondingly small advance in spiritual development, we can control the complex machinery we have created. Like the fabled Frankenstein it threatens at every turn to crush it.

We have advocated governmental action and punishment for those responsible for the Illinois tragedy, but after all force is not the solution. There should be punishment, of course, but the real remedy lies deeper. It is in the hearts and souls of each of us.

We must guard our own conduct, build up our own spiritual reserves, so that we may control ourselves and aid our weaker fellows to gain mastery of their passions.

There is a spirit of hatred abroad in the land; hatred bred of greed, bigotry, intolerance and stupidity that must be overcome. It is the duty of every good American to war against this evil thing, lest it grow and rend us, staining this country with such ghastly wreckage, such mockery of our vaunted claims of Christianity and civilization, as marred the coal field countryside yesterday.
