MUST REFORM

OREGON'S political hysteria in the recent primary campaign focused the attention of the entire nation on this state. Undoubtedly we received a severe setback through this volume of undesirable publicity.

Men with money to invest do not look favorably upon a field where such unaccountable frenzies as were shown here can be raised by the slight crook of the demagogic finger. And Oregon, with the greatest wealth of undeveloped resources in the nation, cannot keep up with the procession of western progress unless outside capital can be applied to the development of her resources.

With the renomination at the republican primaries of Governor Olcott by a narrow margin practically assured, Oregon emerges from the contest not wholly dishonored. In a vicious and degrading campaign the state has made a lamentable exhibition of itself.

Oregon has deserved the reputation in the past of being a progressive and highly intelligent state. It is an amazing thing that a community so regarded should be the scene of a bitter campaign in which, to the neglect of practical issues, first appeal was made to racial and religious passion.
