THE STRAND

"Woman's Man" is the title of the picture that will be seen at the Strand theatre tonight. Romaine Fielding stars in this picture and it is his first picture since his discharge from the service.

During the war, Romaine Fielding was connected with the government service enlisting as a lieutenant. He was discharged at the end of the war as Lieutenant Colonel. During his service of a little less than two years, Mr. Fielding was instrumental in helping to end the war.

In "Woman's Man," Romaine Fielding has selected a fit vehicle in which to return to the screen. His last picture previous to his entering the service was "For the Freedom of the World," a Goldwyn picture. Mr. Fielding wrote the scenario for this picture and played the leading part.

New faces appear among the players in D. W. Griffith's First National attraction, "The Idol Dancer," appearing at the Star theatre Thursday.

Richard Barthelmess, the young man whom Griffith developed in a few months into one of the screen's most effective players, appears as the beachcomber, a role demanding dramatic resources of the distinctive nature Barthelmess possesses.

Clarine Seymour, who has taken important parts in several recent Griffith productions, plays the part of a half French, half Japanese beauty, slender, impulsive, tempestuous with the vividness of the tropics. She dresses like the natives but is not of them, and her friendship with the beachcomber and the New England youth develops into the perplexity of growing love for one or the other.

THE LIBERTY

The biggest thrill since the ice scene in "Way Down East" is seen in "Alias Phil Kennedy," the fast moving western which comes to the Liberty theatre today. Bill Patton, a new type of western daredevil, as the title character, rescues the heroine right at the brink of a waterfall in a scene which will make audiences gasp. Dixie Lamont plays the girl.

At another point in the film, he is pursuing the villain, who is speeding in a motor car towards the railroad and escape. Patton, on horseback, is being outdistanced by the car, when he calls on nerve and strategy to help him. The road takes a sharp hair-pin turn, doubling on itself around a spur of mountain. But he landed on the tonneau of the car, grappled with the villain, and subdued him after a sharp tussle.
