TOMORROW

WHEN, one-hundred and forty-six years ago, the delegates of the American colonies affixed their signatures to the Declaration of Independence, a government unlike any the world had ever known, and founded upon principles God-given instead of man-made, took form.

When they asserted the self-evident truth of the proposition that all men are created equal and endowed with certain inalienable rights, they voiced a doctrine for which men had struggled and died for centuries, but which had never before been translated so clearly into words, nor set up as the controlling governmental principle.

Consider the three outstanding rights. Life is given to all alike. It is maintained in all by the same processes. As the greatest of all the Creator's handiwork, life is the most sacred of blessings and the greatest deprivation that can be worked upon a member of the state is the deprivation of life. Therefore the founders of the new government sought to throw about the life of every citizen the same safeguards that in monarchial governments had heretofore hedged the persons of royalty and royalty's favorites.

Without liberty, in thought and action, life becomes a curse instead of a blessing. In the new land all were guaranteed the same breadth of freedom.

And Happiness, of course, naturally reigns where every citizen is untrammelled in the exercise of his freedom to work out his individual destiny; where his right to development is recognized as inherent and not dependent on the whim of some man-made potentate.

From any angle of analysis the Declaration of Independence is unassailable. It establishes a foundation for a government that stands supreme above every preceding governmental attempt and is so absolutely perfect in concept and expression that it cannot be improved upon.

As another anniversary of its adoption rolls by, let us consider its perfection and strive to act in accordance with its principles.

Remember the right it establishes are inherent: neither conferred by the power of one individual, nor subject to abridgement by the will of a misguided majority. For the opinion of the majority is not always correct, and the wrongful deprivation of one's God-given rights in no more defensible if it is accomplished through the will of a million men than if it is accomplished through the will of one.

The constitution bars the abuse of power by individuals who may be briefly elevated to seats of power; but a misguided electorate, misled by unscrupulous and selfish persons, may constitute a majority who can as effectively throttle freedom as ever a despot did.

Tomorrow's anniversary should be more than a day of picnicking and pleasure, of red fire and noisy demonstration. It should be a day de-

You are hereby summoned and required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons in The Evening Herald, a newspaper, which said date is the 26th day of June A. D. 1922.

And you will take notice that if you fail to appear and answer or otherwise plead, within the said time, the plaintiffs will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in their complaint, to-wit, for judgment against the said defendants, C. R. Hibberd and Jessie Hibberd, his wife, and John Balsiger Jr. and Mary Balsiger, his wife, for the sum of One-Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), with interest thereon from the 31st day of December, A. D. 1921 at the rate of 7% per annum; and for the additional sum of One-Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) as attorneys' fees, and for its costs and disbursements herein.

And for a decree of this Court, declaring the trust deed set up in said complaint to be a mortgage, and foreclosing the mortgage, which trust deed and mortgage are upon the following described real property, to-wit: The West half of the Northwest quarter and the West half of the Southwest quarter of Section Thirty-four (34), Township Thirty-nine (39) south, Range Twelve (12), East of the Willamette Mer-

idian, containing One-Hundred and Sixty (160) acres of land, more or less, and ordering that the said property be sold by the Sheriff of Klamath County, Oregon, in the manner by law in cases of this kind provided, and that the proceeds of such sale be applied:
