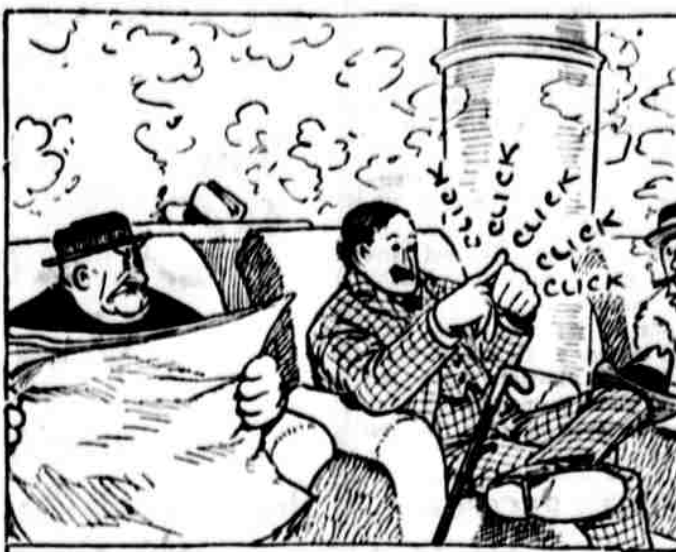

SPECIAL BOND AND CONTRACT ELECTION MALIN IRRIGATION DISTRICT.

Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held on Friday, the 28th day of July 1922, at the hereinafter specified polling place in Malin Irrigation District, Klamath County, Oregon, to determine whether bonds of said District in the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) shall be issued for the purpose of providing funds for procuring necessary reclamation works, acquiring the necessary property and rights therefor, for purchase and acquisition of canals, water rights, and for work and construction, and for otherwise carrying out the provisions of law, and for the further purpose of voting upon the following question:

"Shall the Malin Irrigation District of Klamath County, Oregon, enter into a contract with the United States of America for a water right for the lands of said District wherein and whereby the maximum amount to be paid for said water right is to be thirty-four dollars per acre for each and every irrigable acre within the boundaries of the said District and an annual operation and maintenance charge equal to one-half the charge assessed against the lands of the Klamath Project and an equitable proportion of any expense incurred by the United States in regulating the water level of Upper Klamath Lake and the proportionate part of the cost of additional drainage upon the Klamath Project made necessary by the increased seepage upon the Klamath Project caused by the work provided for in said contract, not exceeding, however, ten dollars per acre for such drainage."

The polls shall be opened at eight o'clock on the morning of the election, and be kept open until five o'clock in the afternoon, when the same must be closed.

At such election, the ballots shall contain the words "BONDS—YES" and "BONDS—NO," and the words "CONTRACT WITH THE UNITED STATES—YES" and "CONTRACT WITH THE UNITED STATES—NO."

The Board of Directors have specified the following polling place in said District for said election: The Shasta View School House located approximately in the Southeast quarter of Southeast quarter of Section 6, Township 41 South, Range 12 East of the Willamette Meridian within the boundaries of the said Malin Irrigation District.

Said election must be held and the result thereof determined and declared in all respects as nearly as practical in conformity with the provisions of law governing the election of officers.
